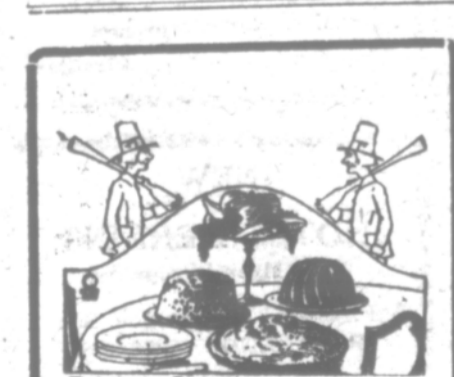

Picture Show News  
For The Current Week

The gay night life of the Paris theatres, the carnival spirit and the luxury of its marble cafes romp thru "One Year to Live," yet, underlying the maddening pace, is a thought which remains in the mind long after "finis" has been written to the film. What would you do if you had but one year to live?

The plot revolves about a young and beautiful girl in a Parisian theatre whose physician informs her she has only one year to live. The girl faces the dual problem of death and the future of a beloved, dependent younger sister who is hopelessly an invalid. There is but one way out and she accepts it. She goes to a designing theatrical magnate and offers herself as a sacrifice for stage fame, in order that she may provide for her sister.

"Mary Pickford's latest production, "Through the Back Door," shows Mary in a child role which at the same time is a character part. The story is a combination of comedy and drama, punctured with many of those laughable pranks for which Little Mary is famous when portraying a pig-tailed kiddie. From the farms of Belgium to the mansions of Long Island the camera follows this clever little actress in "Through the Back Door." Mother love and the heart hunger of a child all bound up in an intricate society drama, supply the emotional impulses of the play. The scenario is from the pen of Marion Fairfax, well known photo playwright and dramatist, Jack Pickford and Alfred E. Green directed, while that wizard of the lens Charles Rosher, presided over the camera.

Vulgarity is a form of tactlessness. That is the belief Harold Lloyd's mother instilled in her son in tender years when he had no idea of becoming the screen's greatest comedian. And that teaching of tactfulness, she believes, is the reason why Harold's comedies are always free from vulgarity. "The Freshman" is as clean as the proverbial hound's tooth. Its gags are woven into a human and humorous story of a freshman who is the college boob but thinks he is a hero, which he really does become when he—only the water boy—wins an exciting football game.

A double bill will be given the public this Sunday afternoon at Moro theatre when the screen play "Through the Back Door" will be part of the entertainment offered in conjunction with the program to be put on by Miss Belle Laughlin and her company of novel entertainers. Their part of the program will include singing, dancing, music, and the screamingly funny farce "The Blue Law." Admission will be 25c and 50c.

Reports say that this is an excellent presentation of this American classic depicting early American colonial history. The program will be supplemented by vocal and instrumental numbers. Lone Rock Road Now Open  
County Judge E. D. McKee informs the Sherman County Observer that the steel bridge, crossing Lone Rock canyon, has been moved to the new bridge location and that the Lone Rock market road will be ready for travel by the public after this Saturday night. The road will be completed past the county fair grounds to a point opposite the experiment farm and, pending definite routing into Moro, the old road will be rock surfaced past the experiment farm buildings to the brow of the hill overlooking Moro. A short stretch of road is yet to be completed from the crusher plant to the flat towards the new bridge; this will be graded during the winter months and surfaced in the spring before removal of the crusher to a new location. Definite right-of-way through the experiment farm will be disposed of at the next meeting of the state legislature in 1927.
