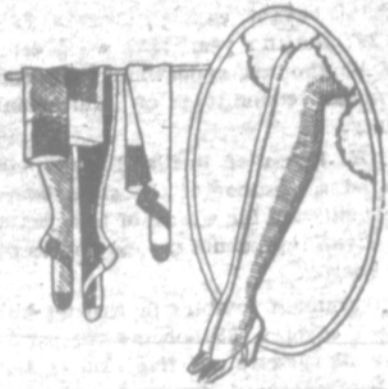

HOUSE WORKING ON REVENUE MEASURE

Non-partisan Character of Bill Eliminates Organized Opposition.

Washington, D. C.—The \$325,000,000 tax reduction bill has reached the test stage in the house, and on Monday some of its major provisions were taken up for approval.

More than 30 hours of debate on the measure, last week, developed general endorsement from both the democrats and republicans, but the bill faces at least a dozen amendments, which will be offered on vital points.

Sponsors of the measure, which was framed by the ways and means committee, predicted however that it would be approved by the house before the end of this week and practically without change.

The non-partisan character of the bill has won support for it during the long debate from both sides of the chamber. Representative Garrett of Tennessee, the democratic leader, gave it his endorsement, though he opposed vigorously the provision to give appointments to members of the tax appeals.

Scattering opposition also appeared to the proposed 50 per cent reductions in the maximum surtax and inheritance tax rates.

The opposition apparently is not organized on party lines against any of the provisions, and Representative Green, republican, of Iowa, chairman of the ways and means committee, and Representative Garner of Texas, ranking democrat on the committee, were prepared to lead the fight for complete approval of the compromise measure. Mr. Green has served notice he will not sanction any increase in reductions of taxes proposed in the bill.

BUDGET ESTIMATE HIGHER FOR 1926

Washington, D. C.—The expenditures of the federal government for the coming fiscal year were estimated by President Coolidge at \$2,896,207,921, an increase of \$160,038,326 over the outlay for the current year.

The president informed congress in his budget message that the minimum cost of running the government had been about reached, and that the normal expansion of a growing nation would henceforth involve added expenditure to keep the government machinery in motion.

The budget estimates, transmitted with the message, reflected the continuing efforts at economy. Mr. Coolidge said, adding that on the basis of the calculations, a surplus of \$330,307,000 was indicated for the fiscal year 1927. He expects a surplus of \$262,041,756 for the year ending next June 30, although a year ago it was estimated that the surplus this year would exceed \$373,000,000.

NYE IS TURNED DOWN

Report on North Dakota's Senatorship is Against Seating.

Washington, D. C.—An unfavorable report on the seating of Gerald P. Nye as senator from North Dakota was adopted by the senate elections committee.

Only two members of the committee voted in favor of seating Nye, who was appointed by Governor Sorlie to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Ladd.

A subcommittee consisting of Chairman Ernst and Senator Goff, West Virginia, republicans, and Senator George, democrat of Georgia, was appointed to prepare the report for submission to the senate.

Plea to Impeach Seattle Mayor Quashed

Seattle, Wash.—By a vote of six to three, the city council quashed the petition signed by more than 6000 persons to impeach Mayor Brown. The action of the council followed the unanimous report of the council judiciary committee, consisting of William Hickman Moore, Oliver T. Erickson and Philip Tindall, that the petition be denied.

Krim Will Accept French Terms, Tangier, Morocco. — Abd-el-Krim, leader of the Rif tribesmen now at war with France and Spain, will accept the French peace terms as a basis for negotiations, Robert Canning, French peace envoy, announced.

Learner Quite Shipping Body, Washington, D. C.—Meyer Lissner, member of the shipping board from the Pacific coast, has resigned, effective December 31.

Favor Britain in Oil Decision, Geneva.—A decision favorable to Britain was handed down by the League of Nations' council in the Mosul dispute between Turkey and Britain.

AID ON PLANS FOR ARMS MEETING ASKED

Geneva.—The United States Saturday was invited by the League of Nations' council to share in the work of framing an arms conference next year under league auspices.

The invitation followed council ratification of similar requests to Russia, Germany and a group of lesser nations to sit with 10 council members on the disarmament conference preparation commission which will convene here February 15.

The conference, intended to mark a new stage in delimitation of land armaments, is planned as a sequel to the security achievements at Locarno.

An effort to meet President Coolidge's views in favor of separate land and naval conferences failed when the council decided unanimously that military, naval and aerial aspects should be considered in preparing for the parity. Representatives of France, Japan and Italy announced that their governments could not consider separating these phases.

Britons Like Soda Straws. American soda straws are now popular in Great Britain. Last year 50,000,000 straws were consumed by patrons of British fountains and tea rooms, and most of them came from America. Japanese straws are on the market, but are of inferior quality. The soda fountain trade has developed by leaps and bounds, the consumption of ice cream having increased 1,000 per cent during the last year.
