INSURGENTS LOSE COMMITTEE POSTS

Washington, D. C.—House republican insurgents, with one exception, were swept from the more important standing committees by the republican committee on committees. Representative Cooper of Wisconsin, although removed from his ranking position on the foreign affairs committee, was retained on its roll at the bottom of the republican list of members. Despite that he had been the candidate for speaker of the insurgent group, the republican leaders showed leniency in his case, it was explained, because of his long service in the house, of which he is in this respect the "dean." Representatives Lampert and Nelson of Wisconsin, the only members of the insurgent group who held chairmanships, were taken from these offices. Other members of the group affected by the committee assignments included Representatives Browne, Wisconsin, and Sinclair, North Dakota, taken from agricultural committee; Peavey removed from the rivers and harbors committee and Schneider from the postoffice committee. Representatives Nelson and Frear of Wisconsin were ejected from the rules and ways and means committees, respectively, when these were organized some time ago.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Judge Bayard T. Hainer of Oklahoma was appointed as chief counsel for the federal trade commission. Gold production in the United States in 1924 was valued at \$52,277,000, an increase of \$500,000 over 1923, the treasury has announced. The Italian chamber of deputies, at behest of Premier Mussolini, approved a measure making arbitration of all disputes—between capital and labor compulsory. Outstanding prosperity for America in 1925, with the way cleared for complete world recovery, was predicted by Secretary of the Treasurer Mellon in his annual report submitted to congress. Governor Small of Illinois issued a proclamation establishing an embargo against counties in a number of western states which are infested with alfalfa weevil. The embargo is against infested counties in Idaho, Colorado, Nevada, Oregon and Wyoming. Washington will assist Oregon in resisting the application of western railroads for a five per cent increase in freight rates, according to a pledge given members of the Oregon Public Service commission by officials of the Washington department of public works. Suit Against Louis W. Hill Dropped. St. Paul, Minn.—A million dollar suit pending in New York for four years against Louis W. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railroad, filed by the allied heirs of James J. Hill and Mrs. Hill was dropped last week. The controversy hinged over custody of the famous Hill farm, North Oaks, located near St. Paul, and the ownership of \$750,000 in bonds. The farm and bonds were bequeathed to Louis Hill by his mother, Mrs. James J. Hill, widow of the "empire builder" shortly before she died.

VERMONT LEADS IN SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

Coolidge Home State Recorded as Most Thrifty of Nation.

Washington, D. C.—Practicing economy and thrift at home, as urged by President Coolidge in government affairs, Vermont, home state of the chief executive, has amassed greater savings deposits per capita than any other state.

With a population of only 255,000, Vermonters have accumulated \$172,686,000 in savings accounts. This figure sets a new high record for the country in giving the state a per capita ratio of \$488.15.

New Englanders are the thriftiest, and middlewesterners save less than any other section, statistics made public by the treasury department showed recently.

California is the wealthiest of Pacific states with \$2,803,916,000 in individual deposits and a per capita savings of \$386.24.

Washington and Oregon have per capita savings of \$99.50 and \$98.88 respectively.

Every man woman and child in the United States and its possessions should have had \$142.15 saved by June 30, figures showed. Savings deposits, exclusive of postal savings and demand deposits, were \$18,008,576,000 on that date with the estimated population under the American flag was placed at 126,691,000.

Individual deposits in banks of the nation, including postal savings, interest savings and checking accounts, amounted to \$46,765,942,000 on June 30. The per capita individual deposits were \$269.12.

What "Pan-Fish" Are.

The term pan-fish is many times misinterpreted. Some seem to think that this includes only an inferior sort of species, and others that it is merely a term applicable to most any fish which happens to be taken and which is edible, says the Sportsman's Digest. The true pan-fish is composed of small but game dwellers of the singing waters of brooks, creeks and rivers and the shore lines of the lakes. Bream (blue-gill or sunfish), rock bass, yellow perch, striped perch and the horny chub or dace, are all part and parcel of the pan-fish tribe.

Flats Built for Birds
The hammer-headed stork of Africa makes its nest in the form of a three-room apartment or flat. Large sticks are collected by these birds and placed between branches of trees. Any room of the peculiar nest is big enough to house an average-sized boy.
