OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the public school at Malin.
 Construction of an eight-story office building was announced at Salem. The structure will cost approximately \$100,000.
 Christmas programs and special dinners marked the observance of Christmas at the various institutions at Salem.
 William Ellsworth Purdy, 63, candidate in 1924 for representative in congress from the first congressional district died in Salem.
 A total of \$1375 was taken in by Fred A. Miller, Clackamas county clerk, in hunting, angling and similar licenses during 1925.
 Returns available from Oregon's 18th annual Christmas seal sale indicate that final returns will safely pass the \$50,000 mark.
 Three young men, all under the age of 21 years, made an unsuccessful attempt to rob the State bank of Scotts Mills. The robbers escaped.

P. M. Lundquist of Dundee was killed when the auto he was driving was struck at a grade crossing just north of Dundee by a southbound Southern Pacific train.

Archie Cody, slayer of Sheriff Goodman of Harney county, must pay the death penalty for his crime, according to an opinion handed down by the state supreme court.

Investigation of existing first and second-class express rates from Portland and Spokane to points in Oregon east of Pendleton has been ordered by the public service commission.

Reports from the vicinity of the Santiam pass road state that the pass is practically free from snow and if the road were paved travel into eastern Oregon would be comparatively easy.

Mothers and fathers are purchasing cigarettes for their minor children and are permitting such children to smoke in their homes. It was stated at a recent session of the Cottage Grove city council.

Oregon City's school population has decreased instead of increased during the past year. The 1924 census showed there were 1941 children of school age, and the census for 1925 showed that there were 1921.

An effort will be made by Congressman Willis C. Hawley of Salem and Senator Stanfield to include an emergency appropriation for the continuation of the federal employment office at Eugene and Medford.

Suit to test the so-called motor vehicle registration law, now in operation in Oregon, probably will be filed in the circuit court at Salem soon. It was said that a Eugene attorney is preparing papers in the case.

Sheriffs and other peace officers of Oregon were requested in a letter prepared by the secretary of state not to issue temporary license plates to motor vehicle owners whose machines have heretofore been licensed.

Dr. Earl McFarland, collector of customs at Portland, was complimented by General Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, on the showing of the Portland office in apprehending liquor smugglers.

Sweet peas blooming outdoors at Christmas time is a rare thing even in the mild climate of Oregon, but at Sweet Home, George Flanagan Jr. showed a bouquet of these flowers which he had picked in his yard.

Two of the largest timber-holding concerns in Klamath county, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company and the Long-Bell Lumber company, have entered a strenuous protest against the proposed reissue of Klamath timber.

FARM LOAN GROUPS UNDER INCOME TAX

Washington, D. C.—National agricultural credit corporations have been held subject to income taxation in a ruling by A. W. Gregg, solicitor of internal revenue. When the information leaked out observers saw it as a new element in the rural credit problem.

The ruling held that if the agricultural credit corporations were entitled to exemption at all this must come under section 231 of the act, and then asserted:

"National agricultural credit corporations are not exempt from income taxation under section 231 of the revenue act of 1924."

Attention was called in the ruling to the fact that section 231 specifically carried the revenue act exemptions to certain forms of mutual and governmental agencies of finance. It was suggested as significant that the provision which authorized the formation of the national agricultural credit corporation failed to mention the exemption from taxation which had been granted to federal intermediate credit banks, federal farm loan associations and federal farm loan banks as applicable to the newly authorized agency.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Seattle's mayoralty campaign opened when Edwin J. Brown, John E. Carroll and C. H. Clark filed as candidates.

The population of California has passed the 5,000,000 mark, according to tabulations based on increased property values made public by State Controller Ray L. Riley.

Howard Sutherland, former senator from West Virginia, was appointed alien property custodian. Mr. Sutherland, who is a republican, succeeds F. C. Hicks of New York, who died recently.

The federal trade commission started an investigation of farm cooperative marketing enterprises in the United States, with a view to advising and helping development of successful farm products marketing by farmers.

Frank A. Munsey, who rose from farmer boy to one of the leading newspaper and magazine publishers of the country, died in New York after a stubborn fight to recover from peritonitis which followed an operation for appendicitis.

The fall planting of winter wheat in Washington is estimated to be 855,000 acres, or 23 per-cent less than the acreage sown a year ago. The planting a year ago was 1,240,000 acres of which due to extensive winter-killing, only 372,000 acres were harvested.

The 29th annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers association will be held in Pendleton, January 21-23, according to an announcement made by Mac Hoke, secretary. The meeting will follow the national association's convention in Boise, January 18-20.

40 Persons Dead in Cold Wave

Chicago, Ill. — The holiday zero wave which overspread almost the entire country took a toll of upwards of two scores of lives, a property loss from fires estimated at \$1,000,000 in Chicago alone, and interference with transportation facilities and wire communication were recorded. The largest death toll was in Chicago where 17 persons died in four days. Half a dozen persons were found frozen to death.

British Columbia Liquor Profits Large
 Victoria, B. C.—The finance department reported that profits from government sale of liquor in British Columbia were steadily growing after a sudden drop 18 months ago. Profits for the six months ended September 30 were \$1,551,265, compared with \$1,409,791 for the previous six months.
