OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers

There were seven deaths in Marion county due to traffic accidents in 1925. Hackberries in the Coast mountains around Gardiner are still ripe. Medford has completed the most successful business year in its history, approximately \$5,000,000 having been received in exchange for products shipped to eastern markets. Fruit and lumber revenues formed the major portion. Eight miles of pavement, 350 miles of rock surfacing, 300 miles of grading to state standards and 30 bridges of more than 80-foot span, comprised the important improvements completed by the state-highway department during the year 1925. Ninety-six of the 183 dairies that supply Portland with milk scored between 95 and 100. Dr. D. W. Mack, chief of the city milk division, announced as the result of the semi-annual summary of the condition of the city's milk supply. Recovery of Harry Aiken, about 35, a rancher of the Prospect district, near Medford, is doubtful, following an accidental shooting when a .38-caliber pistol fell from his hip pocket and was discharged as it struck the running board of his automobile. The year's prohibition report for Linn county by District Attorney Lewelling showed the majority of dry law violators chose to go to jail rather than pay the fines imposed. Out of \$15,500 imposed in fines, only \$2490 was paid, the remainder being served. Whether prohibition has proved a success in the state of Oregon is the question that has been referred to Governor Pierce by members of the house of parliament of Australia. A letter requesting the information was received at the executive department at Salem. The valuation of the properties of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company at Baker was \$2,188,000 as of June 30, 1925, according to a report filed in the office of the public service commission at Salem. The company operates extensively in eastern Oregon. The directors of the Coos and Curry fair association at Myrtle Point, where annual fairs are held, have decided to open the business affairs of the organization to the investing public in both counties. Steel for the highway bridge which is to span the Crooked river canyon on the route of The Dalles-California highway is now arriving at Bend and it is expected that the construction of the bridge will start in the next few days. Because the river current is eating into the bank of the Willamette at the northern end of the retirement work placed last summer during bridge construction at Harrisburg, an additional 160 feet of retirement is to be built. To meet the increased demand for marketing information and assistance, L. R. Brethaupt, for six years county agent of Malheur county, has been appointed specialist in marketing and economics on the staff of the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college. Dean George of Betty didn't like the way motorists speeded by him as he jogged along in his more humble motor vehicle, so he used a shotgun in an attempt to puncture the tires of several cars which passed. As a result he will spend the next 60 days in the county jail in Klamath Falls for discharging firearms on a public highway. Robert L. Hutton, 55, member of one of the pioneer families of Harney county, is in the Harney county jail charged with murder, following the killing of Harold Bradley, 18, a laborer at the Hutton ranch on Wagonette mountain. Hutton gave himself up to Sheriff Young of Harney county. He was reported to have said he shot in self-defense. A state income tax from which 50 per cent of the derived revenue shall be used for education was favored by the Oregon State Teachers' association in session in Portland, and a committee will confer with the grants and other state-wide organizations which foster tax revision to draft a bill to be placed on the ballot at the November election.

Anti-Rum Treaties Upheld by Court—San Francisco.—Existing treaties between the United States and Great Britain and Canada designed to stop rum smuggling were given high legal endorsement here when the United States circuit court of appeals upheld the convictions of five members of the crew and agents of the steamer Quadra, Canadian owned, and held that the seizure of that vessel was legal in every respect. In its decision the court automatically upheld the conviction of three minor defendants who did not appeal.

Nebraska Governor to Call Conference.—Lincoln, Neb.—Governor Adam McMillen has decided to call a meeting of 50 representatives of Nebraska's agricultural interest for a conference here relative to seeking farm relief measures. The state supreme court in a brief filed at Salem was requested to affirm the decision of the circuit court for Marion county in the proceedings started by the public service commission to compel the major railroads operating in the state to reduce their rates on hay, grains, and various other farm products from 5 to 25 per cent. The brief was prepared by W. P. Ellis, attorney for the commission. The litigation is the result of a proceeding several months ago wherein an order was entered establishing uniform scales of rates to apply on the lines of all the major carriers in the state.
