WEEK DAY RELIGIOUS SCHOOL WORK SHOWN BY PUPILS

Some one hundred and sixty people gathered at the Presbyterian church last Sunday evening to witness and participate in the demonstration of the work done by the weekday religious school carried on in connection with the Moro public schools. The demonstration was conducted by Mrs. R. A. Fenstra, who is the teacher for this work. She presented one room at a time, and put the pupils through songs, Bible drills, Bible story telling, and catechization on Bible knowledge, thus giving samples of the work done in each grade. The whole was enthusiastically received, and many favorable comments were heard on the splendid work done. An expression of the meeting was to the effect that a similar demonstration be put on some time in the spring, shortly before the close of the school year.

Moro at present holds the unique place of having 100 per cent of the pupils of the eight grades taking weekday religious instruction. The pupils are excused from the regular school work on school time for religious instruction at the request of parents in every case. The teacher must be an accredited teacher with education similar to those in the grades, and in addition must hold a certificate from the state department of public instruction for weekday religious instruction. Moro is fortunate in having two ministers, wives who hold such certificates from the state department. The course of study followed in each room or grade is made by the state superintendent of public instruction. It is expected that weekday religious instruction will be a permanent feature of Moro schools, backed up by the people of Moro.

IN MEMORIAM

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church at Moro on Saturday, January 16th, to honor Mrs. Frances Britton Moquet who passed away at the family home at Union Gap, near Yakima, Washington, Thursday, January 14th. Mrs. Moquet had been ill for several months and had but recently submitted to an operation in the hope that her health would be improved.

Frances E. Britton was born April 2nd, 1860 at Bunker Hill, Illinois. She was married the second time in 1882 to S. C. Kessinger and nine children were born of this union. The youngest of these children, Albert, died March 10th, 1910, at six years of age. The children living to mourn the loss of a good mother are: Luther, by her first marriage; Roy, Roxy, Coila, Mona, Arno, Clyde, Eunice and Lillian. Also Hazel who was born after her marriage to Francis C. Moquet, to whom she was married April 4th, 1905. There are 23 living grandchildren. Miss Britton joined the Seventh Day Adventist church when fifteen years old, and was a church worker wherever she lived. She manifested great faith in God and died happy in her hope of her reward. Her death occurred at Union Gap near Yakima, Washington, January 14th, at 7 a. m.

Letters were sent to the United States army aircraft chief in Washington, D. C. by George E. Love, legislative committeeman of the American Legion and chairman of the state aeronautical committee, regarding proposals for suitable landing fields in Oregon. As soon as a reply to these letters has been received Mr. Love will communicate with all parts of the state, asking for the appointment of aircraft committees to locate fields for commercial and emergency landing places.

For flax measuring 36 inches and over for processing at the state flax plant operated in connection with the Oregon penitentiary, the growers will receive \$40 a ton this year, according to announcement made at the executive department in Salem. For flax measuring from 30 to 36 inches the growers will receive \$38 a ton, from 27 to 30 inches, \$35 per ton, from 24 to 27 inches \$32 per ton, and under 24 inches \$28 per ton. For mowed flax the state will pay to the growers \$20 per ton.

The Oregon state tax commission has filed original mandamus proceedings in the state supreme court to compel Harley J. Studer, sheriff of Clatsop county, to serve delinquent warrants and collect state income taxes aggregating \$2000 from the Astoria North Beach Ferry company, Union Fishermen's Co-Operative Packing company and Frank G. Howe. The suit was filed for the purpose of determining the validity of collecting delinquent state income taxes under warrants issued by the state tax commission and to protect the sheriff against personal liability in connection with the seizure of property to satisfy the tax obligations.

The following Oregon boatmasters have been recommended for appointment by Willis C. Hawley, representative from the first district: C. W. Halderman, Astoria; Harry E. Jones, Jefferson; William G. Smith, Mill City; Robert G. Allen, Silverton; Mrs. Ollie Gillespie, Willamina; Lyman H. Shorey, Woodburn.

Ellis Williams of Cottage Grove, who on October 23 was shot in the groin by a deputy sheriff when he resisted arrest on a charge of transporting liquor, began suit in circuit court at Eugene against Sheriff Taylor, Melvin Turnbull and T. H. Maxwell, deputy sheriff, for \$25,000 damages on account of the injury.

A million eastern brook trout eggs to replenish the game commission's stock of these fish used for egg-taking purposes was received by the game commission from the northern part of Washington and sent to the Tumalo hatchery. The young fish will be planted in East lake and Elk lake in eastern Oregon, where egg-taking stations for this species of fish are now maintained.
