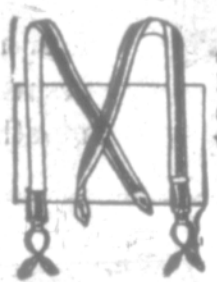

WHEAT CONFERENCE IS DOWN TO SERIOUS BUSINESS

The Eastern Oregon Wheat conference went into session Thursday with addresses by F. B. Ingels, chairman, and Paul V. Maris, director of the college extension service, explaining the purpose, scope and method of the meet. The five subcommittees went into executive session to iron out their problems. W. J. Spillman, consulting specialist of the federal bureau of economics, will address the meeting Thursday evening on the world wheat situation as it affects the Oregon farmer.

Investigations of the five big problems will continue all day Friday and Saturday. The report of the five groups will be taken on the co-ordinated recommendations, and printing and distribution of the findings authorized.

The first report, finance and credit, will be presented at 9:30 by L. Barnum, The Dalles banker, and Fred Bannion, agent of Umatilla county. It will consider short-time and long-time credit to farmers, and running on borrowed capital.

The report of the wheat handling committee will follow as presented by F. B. Ingels, Dufur wheat grower, chairman, and G. R. Hyslop, farm crops specialist of the experiment station, secretary. It considers federal inspection criticism, charges of rail and water transportation, cooperative selling, and how and when to sell.

The world supply and demand comes next, brought forward by the chairman, A. R. Shumway, Milton wheat grower, and the secretary, L. R. Breithaupt of the extension service. How Canada with its cheaper lands, taxes and transportation for wheat production affects the situation is one of the big questions. Prospects and effects of losing the wheat acreage of irrigated wheat, are others.

Managing the big wheat farm is the next subject of report. E. M. Hilden, Blalock grower, is chairman, and R. W. Morse, agent of Morrow county, secretary. Does it pay to run sidelines of sheep, dairy cows, hogs or poultry on the big wheat farm, and is production of wheat cost reduced by enlarging an already big farm, are some of the questions.

The report of the tillage and production committee will wind up the business in the late afternoon. The place and kinds of diversification, if any, varieties of wheat, and methods of culture, are outstanding problems. Harry Pinkerton, Moro wheat grower, is chairman, and D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Moro station, secretary.

With delegates from 16 wheat growing counties of Oregon present, the Eastern Oregon Wheat Growers Economic Conference opened Thursday morning in the high school building. Local committees under the direction of W. H. Ragsdale have completed arrangements for the entertainment of all comers, and those unable to find accommodations in hotels and restaurants will be cared for in private homes, and by meals served by women's organizations.

A special car carrying delegates from the Oregon Agricultural college, and business men from the Willamette valley was supplied by the railroad and will be parked in the yards this week to serve as living quarters for that group, thus relieving the general congestion.

All day meetings of the wheat conference will be held at the high school building. All the evening meetings will be held at the opera house. Press headquarters will be in the Masonic club room, over the Bank of Moro.

DEATH TAKES THREE MEMBERS FROM DOUMA FAMILY

Funeral bells tolled three times on successive days in a very sad and strange manner the last week in January for Mr. and Mrs. Jake Douma and family, now residents of Tillamook, Oregon.

Sunday, January 24th, 1926, at 4 p. m., a cousin of Mrs. Douma, Luther Edwards, aged 48, was drowned at Oceanside beach.

Monday, January 25th, 1926, at 9 p. m., Velda Marie, aged 1 month 28 days, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Douma, passed away.

And yet the grim reaper was not satisfied for on Tuesday, January 26th, 1926, at 6 a. m., Jasper Edwards, an uncle of Mrs. Douma, was summoned to his future home.

Little Velda Marie Douma and Jasper Edwards were laid to rest in the cemetery near Dundee, Oregon, on Thursday, January 28th. The body of Luther Edwards has not been found.

Jake Douma is a brother of the four Douma brothers of this city and a former resident of Moro.

Flying Speed of Birds

The crow is the least rapid of a list of 22 migratory birds, flying an insignificant average of 45 feet a second, or 30 miles an hour. Curlews and Jacksnipes can fly 55 and 65 feet a second, while quails, prairie chickens and ruffed grouse can make 75 feet. The dove can reach a speed of 100 feet a second, or 68 miles an hour, although its usual rate is less. Redheads, blue-winged teal, green-winged teal, Canada geese and different varieties of brant can fly over 100 feet a second, ranging in speed from 65 to 98 miles an hour; but usually fly at a much slower gait.

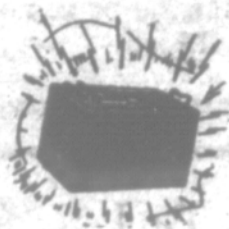

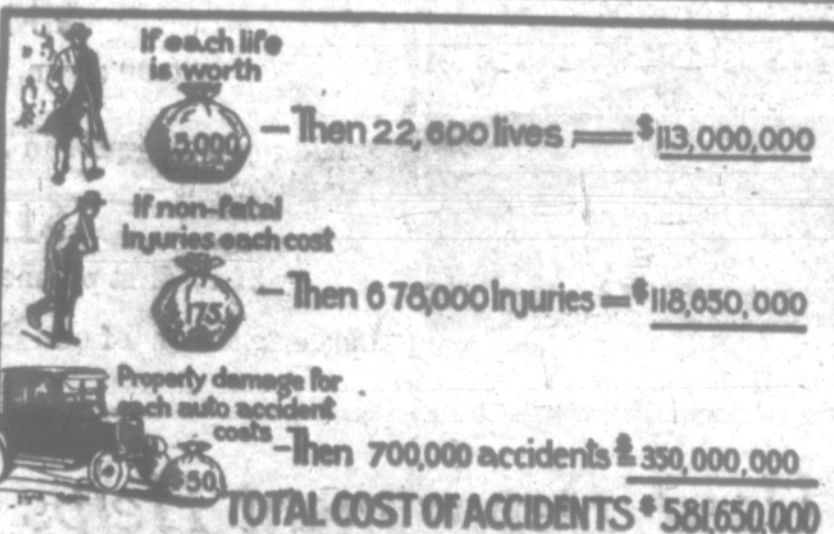

\$600,000,000 a Year Loss Caused by Auto Accidents



CLOSE to \$600,000,000 a year is the annual economic loss due to automobile accidents, both fatal and non-fatal. This appalling sum is only an estimate as no complete figures on the number of automobile accidents in the United States are available, but it has been conservatively estimated that 22,600 lives are lost each year by automobiles, and \$5,000 a human life is the lowest value put on it by economists.

Of non-fatal accidents 678,000 occur annually, causing average cost of \$75. Then, each accident averages \$50 property damage, insurance records show. This makes the staggering total of \$50,850,000 a year.

No account is taken here, points out the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, of the economic value of time lost by the injured due to delays caused by accidents or to minor property values, such as bent fenders, expense incurred while motor vehicles, particularly the commercial ones, are out of service, due to accidents. Were all these taken into the reckoning, the total figure would surely be doubled, or around \$1,118,750,000.

Some idea of the enormity of this economic loss, most of which is avoidable, can be gained by such relationships as these: It is twice the cash income of the 1923 wheat crop; it is equal to about one-third of the much discussed French debt to this country; and, finally, this loss would buy the entire city of Chicago at its present realty assessment valuation.
