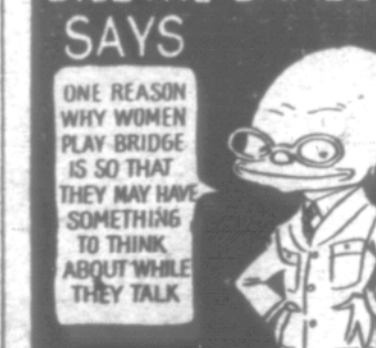

Picture Show News For The Current Week

Mr. Zevely stated that the school children of Sherman county would present a historical pageant for the occasion and requested that The Dalles furnish several musical numbers.

In the belief that a \$250,000 bond issue is the only solution of the problem of financing many proposed municipal improvements, the chamber of commerce of Klamath Falls has formally endorsed the bond issue and pledged itself to do everything possible toward having the proposal placed on the ballot at the May primary election.

The state highway department of Oregon expects to spend \$7,000,000 during 1926 in improvement of roads under its control, according to a survey of prospective highway construction for the year, issued by the bureau of roads at Washington, D. C. To this sum the federal government will contribute \$1,119,948 from available federal aid funds.

Following the action of the state board of control in increasing the salary of J. Lyman Steed, superintendent of the state school for the deaf, from \$1800 to \$2100 a year, beginning September 1, superintendents of a number of other state institutions have indicated that they would seek similar increases in their paychecks within the next few weeks.
