Gentlemen:

After watching the Case combine in my neighbor's field for two years I decided that it would be economy for me to discard my old machine and buy a Case of my own. Accordingly I purchased a 14 ft. cut, Case hillside combine this year. MAKING GOOD

WHAT would I say, I am asked, to a young man, ambitious and in earnest, if he should come to me and ask me in a few words to tell him "What must I do to make good?"

I have watched the progress and development of a good many thousand young men since I entered college, and I have seen not a few of them succeed. It goes without saying, that if a man is going into any business or profession his chances for success are dependent pretty directly upon his character and the extent of his education, and his preliminary training. A man should give himself the most thorough theoretical education within his reach. No man is likely to succeed in any business or profession who is not willing to work hard.

Most young fellows do not object seriously to hard work if it is something they like, that is interesting or easy. The straight level paved road they make no objection to, but when they strike a muddy hill they hang back. If a man would make good he must have character. Shrewdness and trickery may easily win for a time, but in the end the man will not get far unless he is honest, dependable and trustworthy. Persistence, determination, backbone are necessary to success. One must stick to a job until it is finished. A man must believe in himself if he would succeed. He must be willing to take responsibility and to do whatever comes to his hand, whether it seems exactly his job or not. For, in doing this, he will make himself a man whose place it would be difficult to fill.

OREGONIAN RADIO STATION RATES BEST ON COAST

KGW's new 1000 watt Western Electric transmitter was placed on the air a few days ago in preliminary tests and gave an excellent account of itself under a wide variety of operating conditions. The new station is now in active operation and has been widely reported to be far superior to the 500 watt equipment previously used.

All apparatus is located on the eleventh floor of the Oregonian tower three floors below the site of the old station and three floors above the new studio suite and control room. Motor generator units and the pump for cooling the giant amplifier tube are placed in an adjoining room with-in easy reach of the operator. The radio frequency panel, which also contains indicating and control instruments for the power supply, is located adjacent the operating table and volume control panel so that the operator has the entire system before his eyes at all times. This arrangement insures ease and accuracy of operation and also makes it possible for one operator to control the entire system without the aid of an assistant.

The completed mechanical and electrical installation represents the highest degree of engineering perfection in design and calculation. All equipment has been built and assembled in the laboratories of the Western Electric company and embodies many new exclusive features in design. This is especially true in the low frequency amplifiers, which have been calculated to pass a frequency range of sufficient width to include any extreme in tones generally encountered in the musical scale.

With the increased power, KGW is confident of furnishing better and more consistent service to radio listeners in the Pacific northwest, and also of reaching an even larger clientele that is now catered to. The approach of the summer months, when excessive atmospheric disturbances rule the air, the higher powered station will accomplish a real service by efficiently covering the prescribed territory with a consistent day and night signal.

Refunding of outstanding bonds of Oregon irrigation districts through the issuance of state bonds as a solution to the present financial dilemma now faced by irrigation projects in this state, was suggested by State Treasurer Kay, a member of the state irrigation securities commission, at a conference at Salem.

There are 3251 radio sets on the farms of Oregon, it has been disclosed by a recent survey by the department of commerce. That the radio is nearly as popular as tractors is shown in the report that there are 5771 tractors on 5455 Oregon farms. The total number of farms in the state is 55,908, an increase of 5702 since 1920.

Unless tax receipts increase materially the state treasurer on April 10 will be compelled to draw from the various state depositories a large amount of money to defray current expenses of the state government. The shortage of funds is due, the state treasurer said, because of interest due from the state on April 1.

The senate public lands committee has reported favorably on a bill for reconveyance of Sand Island, at the mouth of the Columbia river, from the government to the state of Oregon. The island originally was ceded by the state to the government in 1864 with the understanding that it would be used for military purposes. The state contends that the island was not so used but was leased for fishing purposes.
