PRESBYTERIANS HOLD ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING

The Moro Presbyterian church held its annual congregational meeting in the church last Wednesday evening following a bountiful potluck supper, which helped to put all in excellent spirits. Rev. Henry G. Hanson acted as moderator of the meeting and Harry B. Pinkerton as secretary. Reports were read from the various organizations. The Dorcas Society had spent \$275 and had \$134 in the treasury. The Sunday school had spent \$196 during the year, of which \$67 went for church benevolences. The Missionary Society gave \$91 of which \$15 went to Albany college and \$70, its quota for the boards. This organization has \$13 in the treasury. The church proper paid out about \$2100 and ended the year with all local obligations met and a few dollars in the treasury.

The following trustees were elected for the ensuing year: Harry B. Pinkerton, C. V. Balknap, Hans Thompson, Eugene Amidon and George A. Williams. Mr. Amidon was made chairman of the board and George A. Williams, secretary. The trustees were requested to elect a treasurer for the church out of their own number.

A budget of \$2100 for local support and \$325 for benevolences was adopted. The benevolences will be taken care of in part by the organizations of the church. The remainder is to be raised in the one budget with that for local support. The new pension plan of the Presbyterian church was freely discussed and then laid on the table to be taken up at a special meeting to be held on Sunday morning, May 2nd, in connection with the preaching service. The new pension plan, if adopted, involves the paying of \$155 a year into the fund, a sum equal to 7 1/2% of the pastor's salary. The pastor will also pay 2 1/2% of his salary into the same fund.

NOTICE OF GAME FISH STREAM CLOSING

Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and game fish of all kinds is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken during the periods of time hereinafter specified from the streams and waters hereinafter named, and that during the period of time beginning on the 15th day of April, 1926, and ending on the 15th day of April, 1926, both dates inclusive, it shall be unlawful for any person to kill, angle for, take or have in possession, any species of trout or other game fish of any kind or species from the following described streams and waters of the State of Oregon, to-wit:

Benton County—Mays river and all tributaries thereof, except Muddy creek.

Clackamas County—Deep Creek and Rock creek. All tributaries of Eagle creek. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Clackamas river. Milk creek and all tributaries, including Canyon creek, closed above the mouth of Canyon creek. Gauley creek, Pine creek, Trout creek, and the South Fork of the Molalla river. Coal creek, a tributary of Butte creek. Clackamas Lake and all streams emptying into said lake. Oak Grove Fork of Clackamas river for a distance of one mile below the Clackamas Ranger Station.

Clatsop County—Beeman creek, Volmers creek, Johnson creek, Muddy creek, Mail creek, Klotchie creek, and the south fork of the Necanicum river, and all tributaries thereof. North Fork of the Necanicum river for a distance of one mile above its mouth.

Coos County—Ferry creek and all tributaries thereof. All tributaries of the East Fork of the North Fork of the Coquille river. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Coquille river, except the East Fork of the North Fork and Middle creek. All tributaries of the Middle Fork of the Coquille river above its junction with the South Fork of said river, except Lower Rock Creek. All tributaries of the South Fork of the Coos river above its junction with the North Fork of said river. All tributaries of the East Fork and the West Fork of the North Fork of the Coos river. All tributaries of the North Fork of the Coos river above its junction with the South Fork of said river.

Crook County—Little Summit creek. Deep creek, closed above the mouth of Little Summit creek. Kay Creek closed above the mouth of Little McKay creek.

Curry County—All the tributaries of Floras creek, Siles river and Elk river. Willow Creek and all tributaries thereof.

Deschutes County—Deschutes river from the Impounding Dam in said river to the mouth of Snow creek, including Quinn creek and Cultus creek, this portion of the Deschutes river is known as Crane Prairie. That portion of Elk lake lying north of a line extending across said lake from Elk Point, being 750 feet northeast from the quarter section corner of sections 31 and 32, township 18, range 8 east, Willamette Meridian; thence due east 1500 feet to the east shore of said lake. That portion of East lake lying west of a line beginning at a point on the north shore of said lake, 20 chains south of the quarter corner between sections 19 and 20, township 21, range 13 east, Willamette Meridian; thence running south 26 degrees, west, across said lake to a point on the south shore of said lake, 7 1/2 chains north of the quarter corner between sections 30 and 31, township 21 south, range 13 east, Willamette Meridian.

Douglas County—Calapooya river and all tributaries thereof above the Nonpareil Dam in said river. Rock creek and all tributaries thereof. Lake creek for a distance of 800 yards below a point where said creek emerges from Diamond Lake. Honey creek, Susan creek, Cougar creek, and Clearwater river, and all tributaries thereof. Camp creek above the falls on said creek, and all tributaries thereof. That portion of Diamond lake lying northwest of a line, beginning at a point on the northeast shore 800 feet northwest of the mouth of Bear creek, thence running diagonally across said lake to a point on the west shore of said lake 1450 feet north of the mouth of Silent creek.

Grant County—Canyon creek and tributaries which flow through or border on the lands owned by William Byram Estate. Canyon creek for a distance of one-half mile below and one-half mile above the state trout hatchery. Upper Myrtle creek.

Harney County—George Whiting creek, Rattlesnake creek, Little Spring creek, Crowfoot creek, Dodson creek, Burnt Cabin creek, Little Emigrant creek, Sawmill creek and Dairy creek, and all tributaries of above named creeks.

Hood River County—Lost Lake Inlet creek.

Jackson County—Rogue river for a distance of 400 feet below the Gold Ray Dam. Squaw Creek, between Big Squaw lake and Little Squaw lake.

Josephine County—Rogue river for a distance of 400 feet below the Savage Rapids Dam.

Klamath County—Crooked river. Odell creek, from Odell Lake to Davis Lake. Spencer creek. Link river closed for a distance of 200 feet below the dam owned by the California-Oregon Power Company.

Lane County—Richie creek, Johnson creek, Trout creek, Driftwood creek, Granite creek, Indian creek, Gate creek, Martin creek, Deer creek, Quits creek, and Smith river. All tributaries of the McKenzie river. All tributaries of the Yachats river in Lane county. French Pete creek and East Fork creek, tributaries of the South Fork of the McKenzie river. Hill creek, Swift creek, Laird creek, Cool creek, Buck creek, Simpson creek, Big Willow creek and Coffee Pot creek, all tributaries of the Middle Fork of the Willamette River above Oak Ridge. Big Fall creek and tributaries above the National Forest boundary line. Winnebago creek, Champion creek. All tributaries of the Coast Fork of the Willamette River, except Row river. All tributaries of Row river except Mosby creek, Layne creek and Frank Brice creek. Mill creek and tributaries above the Booth-Kelley Dam at Wendling. All tributaries of Mosby creek, Layne creek and Frank Brice creek.

Lincoln County—Alsea river for a distance of 1500 feet below the dam in said river at the Alsea Fish Hatchery, except tributaries of the Siletz river, except Rock creek, Schooner creek and Drift creek. All tributaries of the Alsea river, except Drift creek. Five Rivers and Fall creek. All tributaries of the Yaquina river, except Big Elk creek, Little Elk creek and Olalla creek. Spencer creek. All tributaries of the Yachats river.

Linn County—Hackleman creek. Bilyeu creek, Indian creek, Burnmaster creek, Moose creek, Canyon creek, Gopenny creek, Jordan creek, and Bearing river. Thomas creek and tributaries thereof. Crabtree creek from Island Inn to its source and all tributaries thereof.

Marion County—Little North Fork of the North Santiam river. Davis creek, Powers creek and Little Abiqua creek, tributaries of the Abiqua river. Beaver creek and Battle creek, tributaries of Mill creek. Brush creek and Drift creek. Olalla creek, a tributary of Clackamas river.

Morrow County—Little Butter creek and tributaries, above Lens Postoffice.

Tillamook County—Big Nestucca river and all tributaries above Jones Falls in said river, except Meadow lake. Cedar creek. Trask river for a distance of 800 feet below the dam at the State Fish Hatchery. Slab Creek above the Roosevelt Highway and all tributaries of Slab creek. Little Nestucca river above the Coast Highway near Sulphur Springs Hotel, and all tributaries of the Little Nestucca river. Three Rivers above the mouth of Alder creek, and all tributaries of Three Rivers. Tillamook river above the mouth of Simmons creek, and all tributaries of Tillamook river. Kilchis river above the Red Star camp of the Whitney Lumber Company, and all tributaries of the Kilchis river. Miami river above a point two miles east of the Smith Homestead, and all tributaries of the Miami river. Wilson river above McNamara bridge, and all tributaries except the North Fork and the Little North Fork of the Wilson river. North Fork of the Wilson river closed above the mouth of the West Fork. Little North Fork of Wilson river above Bush Cabin. Trask river above the mouth of the East North Fork of the Trask river, and all tributaries. North Fork of the Trask river above the Bark Shanty, and all tributaries of the North Fork. Hawk creek and all tributaries.

Umatilla County—Umatilla river for a distance of 300 feet below the Three Mile Diversion dam in said river. South Fork of the Umatilla river and all tributaries. All tributaries of Meacham creek, including the North and South Forks. North Fork of the Walla Walla river. South Fork of the Walla Walla river above the Intake Power Plant on said river for a distance of six miles above said plant. North and South Forks of McKay creek and all tributaries. Butler creek, above the bridge. Pearson creek. East Birch creek, from the mouth of Pearson creek to its source. All tributaries of the Umatilla river including the North and South Forks, above Meacham creek.

Wallowa County—Hurricane creek. Little Hurricane creek. East Fork of the Lostine river. Bear creek and tributaries thereof. Yamhill County—Baker creek from dam owned by the City of McMinnville to the source of said creek and all tributaries. Deer creek from the dam owned by the Ryan Lumber Company and all tributaries. Haskins creek and tributaries.

NOTICE—GAME FISH OPEN AND CLOSING SEASON

Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon, on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that the supply of trout and game fish of all kinds is being, and will be, injuriously affected by permitting the same to be taken from any and all streams, lakes and waters in the State of Oregon, except those in Klamath county, during the period of time hereinafter specified, and that it shall be unlawful for any person to take, kill, angle for, or have in possession any trout or other species of game fish from such streams, lakes and waters during the period of time specified, from November 1, 1926, to November 30, 1926; both dates inclusive, except in Klamath county; and further, that all streams, lakes and waters within all of the State of Oregon, be, and are closed, to fishing with hook and line, commonly known as angling, for and during the period of time from November 1, 1926, to November 30, 1926, both dates inclusive, except in Klamath county, State of Oregon, where the open fishing season shall be from April 15, 1926, to November 30, 1926, both dates inclusive. NOTICE—RESTRICTING GAME FISH BAG LIMIT

Notice is hereby given that by an order duly and regularly made by the State Game Commission of the State of Oregon, on the 11th day of January, 1926, it was found and determined that a scarcity of trout and other game fish in the lakes of the State of Oregon now exists, and that the bag limit of trout that may be taken with hook and line, commonly known as angling, in each and every lake of the State of Oregon be, and is reduced to 30 fish, or 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, or 60 fish, or 30 pounds and one fish, in any seven consecutive days, during the year 1926; all in accordance with the provisions of Section 8, Chapter 66, General Laws of Oregon, 1921, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 275, Laws of Oregon, 1925.
