HOME TALENT CHAUTAUQUA DATES ANNOUNCED

At a meeting of the Sherman county Home Talent Chautauqua association held at Moro hotel on April 19th, it was decided that two afternoons and two evenings of home talent chautauqua would be held at DeMoss Memorial park on May 27th and 28th.

Assignments of the four sessions were made by giving Grass Valley the afternoon session on Thursday, Kent the evening session on Thursday, Moro the afternoon session on Friday and Wasco the evening session on Friday.

Voted that R. C. Byers arrange that a baseball game be part of each afternoon entertainment immediately after the program.

Voted that the admission charge be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children over six years of age, and that complimentary admission be given each performer for his own session.

Voted that R. C. Byers be given complete authority to arrange the programs and that each district committee send to him their programs at an early date so that the completed program can be given the public as soon as possible.

Former sessions of the Sherman county Home Talent Chautauqua association have been favorably received by the public and has been means whereby neighbors and friends could visit with each other between sessions. All indications are that the sessions this year will be as good or better than was former efforts and that a large attendance will be present to encourage members of the association to repeat their efforts next year.

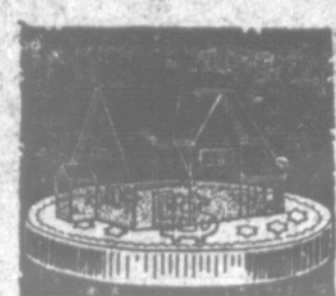
