**FIVE LOCAL SCHOOL FAIRS
HELD LAST WEEK**

A local fair was held in each of the five town schools in the county from April 25 to 30. The first fair was held at Rufus. Each room of the school put on a very excellent exhibit. Locust Grove and Biggs, included in the Rufus local fair district, also had an exhibit of school-room and club work.

The award for the rooms were given as follows: Intermediate room, Rufus 1st; Locust Grove 2d; Primary room, Rufus 1st.

Thyra Fields of Locust Grove received first on her division II sewing and Mary Ellison of Rufus first on her cookery exhibit.

A community dinner was served during the noon hour. The local field meet and trout took place in the afternoon and the local declamatory contest in the evening. Doris Payne and Curtis Thompson of Rufus and Margaret Barnett of Biggs won first place in the A, B, and C divisions respectively. The quality of the work from these schools was of a high type and each exhibit was tastefully arranged and decorated.

Tuesday the Wasco school gymnasium presented a pleasing spectacle with its row of decorated booths on each side of the room. Each grade room and each teacher from the high school had a separate booth and everything was ready by nine o'clock. Some very fine manual training work was shown. During the day the high school paper was prepared and printed on the new high school mimeograph which was temporarily installed in the gymnasium. The exhibit from the domestic art department deserves special mention.
