OUR GREAT INDUSTRIES

Iron and Steel. Mining and Shipping the Ore.

Iron, including steel, which is one of its forms, is without any question the most important and valuable of any of nature's gifts, and is the one element upon which our whole scheme of life must absolutely depend. Take away our iron and you take our modern steel buildings, our large ocean vessels, our machinery. Electro-magnets are made of iron, and without electro-magnets we could have no commercial electricity and consequently no electric light, telephones, telegraph or radio.

So you see that this familiar metal is of tremendous importance, so very important that every boy and girl

should know where it is found, how much it is manufactured and for how many different purposes it is used. Practically all the iron which we produce is mined in the Lake Superior region, mostly in the upper peninsula of Michigan. Along the southern shore of Lake Superior lie rich deposits of iron ore, which is iron in its crude form, before it has been separated from all the other substances with which it is chemically combined.

Some of these large ore beds are very near the surface and can be mined in surface workings. Large open pits are dug into the ground to reach the ore deposits and these are then "worked" by means of steam-shovels, great digging machines that can scoop up five cubic yards of rock and ore with a little trouble as you would take to dig out a handful of sand. Such a machine is shown in the illustration.

The ore is loaded by the big shovels directly onto gondola cars for shipment to the steel mills. These

After eight years as president, Jefferson retired from public life and founded the University of Virginia. He died at Monticello, his estate in Virginia, in 1826, leaving his library to the national government which made it the beginning of the famous Library of Congress.

Famous Figures of American History

Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States, is known as one of the greatest leaders of the time of the Revolution. He was born in Virginia in 1743. At the age of twenty he was graduated from William and Mary College where he won fame as a student and a horseman. He immediately began the study of law and in 1767 was admitted to the bar. His first step on the ladder to fame took place in 1769 when he became a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses.

Here he remained until 1775 when he was elected to the first Continental Congress. From this time forward he rose in fame as one of the great leaders of the Revolution. He drafted the Declaration of Independence.

since in 1775, was governor of Virginia in the gloomiest stage of the war, and after the American Colonies had been recognized by Great Britain as the United States of America, Thomas Jefferson, along with Benjamin Franklin, helped to win the esteem of Europe for our country, as Minister to France.

In 1789, Washington made him secretary of state, and while holding this office he founded the democratic party. In 1801 Jefferson became president of the United States. As president he favored simplicity and

Old Monarchical Idea

The name "Divine Right of Kings" is given to a doctrine that was promulgated in England in the Seventeenth century. It asserted that kings held their authority by divine appointment and were earthly representatives of the Deity. This principle relieved the sovereign of all responsibility toward his subjects, and gave him absolute claim to their obedience. The chief defenders of this doctrine were Salmasius, Hobbes and Sir Robert Filmer; while Milton, Algernon Sydney and Harrington were its uncompromising opponents. The controversy died a natural death on the accession of the House of Hanover. In the Bill of Rights (1689) the right of the people to depose the sovereign, to alter the order of succession, and to confer the sovereignty on whomsoever they may think proper is distinctly set forth.—Kansas City Star.

Health and Home

CARE OF CONVALESCENT IN SUMMER

For those who are just recovering from a serious illness the problem of food is a serious one. The patient, though well on the road to recovery, is usually weakened by the rigors of disease and the excessive heat is wont to sap his energy. Hence, the foods that are consumed during this period should be considered carefully as to digestibility, food value, ease of assimilation, purity and sterility. These are important in any food but especially so when the consumer is not strong and healthy.

In most cases, the one who is convalescing consumes milk in large quantities. This food contains all of the elements that are essential to the body. If milk is pure and germless, it is easily digested and assimilated. Where the milk supply is uncertain, or the quality not of the best, evaporated milk should be employed. It is sterile; it is just pure milk with about sixty per cent of the water removed. Its double richness may be modified, if desired, by the addition of water or it may be used just as it is, where rich, creamy dishes are desired.

Many people make the mistake of confusing evaporated milk with condensed milk. They are not at all similar in appearance, composition or taste. They cannot be used for the same purposes; condensed milk is a combination of sugar and milk; evaporated milk has no added sugar, being pure milk of double-rich quality and food value.

Following are recipes of easily prepared dishes and foods that are well suited for the invalid and the convalescent.

Loganberry Cream.
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup loganberry juice
1/2 cup water
2 tsp. lemon juice
Pinch salt
Put all ingredients in a Mason fruit jar and shake thoroughly. Chill and serve in glasses filled 3/4 full of ice chips. Raspberry, blackberry, and cherry juice may be used instead of the loganberry.

Iced Cocoa.
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup vanilla
Mix cocoa and sugar thoroughly and add the 1/2 cup water and boil over a low flame for 15 minutes. Scald the diluted milk and add cocoa syrup and salt. Continue cooking for 15 minutes in double boiler. Add vanilla. Chill and serve with whipped cream.

Oldest U. S. Library.
The Philadelphia Library, located at South Juniper and Locust streets with a branch at Broad street, is the oldest library in the United States. This library was sponsored by Benjamin Franklin, being his "first project of a public nature."

MEAT STORY CONTEST PRIZES

TOTAL OVER \$2,140

University scholarships are the goal of high school girls who will compete in the third national meat story contest, now getting under way throughout the United States. Headquarters of the national live stock and meat board has sent out formal announcement of the contest's opening to high school home economics instructors in every state. The contest is conducted annually as an aid to class-room study of meat, according to information obtained from the board. Dr. Louis Stanley, chief of the bureau of home economics, U. S. department of agriculture, and other authorities in this field, have co-operated in making the project a success in the past, it is said.

High school girls who compete in the contest are required to write a story on some phase of the meat subject which is to their liking. The story must not exceed 1,500 words. With this story a contestant must submit three meat recipes which she has tested.

The plan as made public by the board provides for cash prizes totaling \$2,140. A portion of this amount will be in cash awards, but it is pointed out that the scholarships constitute the major prizes. Awarding of
