SUNDAY SCHOOL RALLY HELD AT GRASS VALLEY

The county Sunday school rally held at Grass Valley last Sunday morning and afternoon was attended by a large number of the most earnest workers in Sunday school activities in the county, although there was room for more as exemplified by Rev. Cofer of Grass Valley who propounded the question "why is a Sunday school like a Ford car?" and then answered the query by stating that there is always room for more.

The Baptist Sunday school of Grass Valley gave a fine program of four numbers and the Kent Sunday school a fine program of two numbers. These were the only Sunday schools in the county responding at roll call with numbers for the afternoon program.

Rev. Cofer led the singing at the morning session and Mr. I. M. Woods of Grass Valley the singing at the afternoon session. The closing number was the song "Sweet Oregon" sung by Mr. Geo. G. DeMoss and Homer DeMoss, son of Mr. Henry DeMoss who accompanied them on the piano. They only sang two verses of this nationally known song, composed by the DeMoss family which is used to conclude their entertainments, but were insistently called back to conclude the song, which is always a favorite with Sherman county audiences.
