A "Correct" Likeness of Washington



This heroic statue of the commander-in-chief of the first armies of the United States was made for the city of Portland, Oregon, though not yet delivered there by the artist. The western municipality has loaned it to the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, opening in Philadelphia June 1 and continuing until December 1, to celebrate 150 years of American independence. At the foot of the sculpture is shown Pompeio Coppini, the sculptor. Dr. Henry Waldo Poe, of Portland, declares the face to be the most correct likeness of Washington ever modeled.

Boomerangs.
Boomerang-like objects are claimed by some to have existed in ancient Egypt and Assyria, and it may be that certain bone objects which belonged to prehistoric man were used in the same manner as boomerangs. This weapon was used by the Australian bushmen. It averages 2 1/2 feet in length by 2 1/2 inches in width. It is made of the green wood of the acacia, or some other hard wood, treated with fire. In India, boomerangs are made of ivory or steel, and are generally sickle-shaped.

German Order of Iron Cross.
The Iron Cross is a Prussian order of merit instituted by Frederick William III of Prussia March 10, 1813, as a reward for bravery during the "War of Liberation" against France. The decoration is a Maltese cross of iron, edged with silver, and worn either around the neck or in the buttonhole. This order was revived by William I, king of Prussia, July 19, 1870, on the eve of the Franco-German war, and was bestowed by him on his son, the crown prince, for his victory at Wissembourg, August 4, 1870.

Health and Home

ICED DRINKS IN THE SUMMER

On a warm and sultry summer day, there is nothing more refreshing to the mind and to the body than an iced drink. Of course, when such drinks are being used, moderation should be practiced, because if taken in excess or too rapidly, they are liable to be injurious to the stomach. However, when taken in a sensible manner, they are refreshing and beneficial to the fatigued. In the manufacture of these drinks, care should be taken to avoid any combination that may be indigestible or hard to assimilate. The drink should be consumed in a slow and leisurely manner.

The greatest danger present in the use of iced drinks is the one that involves the use of ingredients that are possibly impure or contaminated in any way. This is very liable to happen if the juices that are used are allowed to stand until they become soured and unfit for use, or if the milk or other ingredient used is not strictly fresh. The predisposition of milk to spoil quickly at summer temperatures makes it oftentimes necessary to use evaporated milk, which after all is just pure fresh milk with more than half the water taken away. It is sterile and, therefore, always safe. For use in iced drinks, it is ideal.

Following are several formulas used in the manufacture of iced beverages. If these formulas are followed religiously, the results will be found to be very satisfactory.

Chocolate Malted Milk.
1 cup evaporated milk 2 teaspoonfuls cocoa
1 cup water 2 teaspoonfuls malted milk
Mix cocoa with water until syrup is obtained. Put all ingredients in Mason jar and shake thoroughly and serve with chopped ice.

Milk Punch.
1 cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup orange juice
Sugar to suit 1/4 cup water
1 cup tea Small stick cinnamon
1 cup lemon 1/2 cup fruit juice
1 1/2 cups lemon juice (currant or berry preferred)

Boil slowly the cinnamon, a lemon rind and orange rind in water for ten minutes. Strain and when cool add the other ingredients. Place in a Mason jar and shake well. Serve in tall glasses with chopped ice.

Egg Nog.
1 egg 1 1/4 tbsp. powdered sugar
Pinch salt 1/4 cup water
1/4 cup cold evaporated milk 2 tbsp. fruit juice
1/4 cup ice water Nutmeg gratings
Add salt to egg white and beat to a stiff froth. Add the sugar, the fruit juice and nutmeg. Fill glass with milk and cold water. Sprinkle top with chopped nuts.

First to Scale High Peak.
Mount Washington, in Oregon, was scaled in August last for the first time on record. Six boys from Bend, Ore., none more than 21 years old, after hours of arduous work reached the top, most pinnacle. At one time a member of the party lost his foothold and clung desperately to the face of a perpendicular cliff, with an 800-foot abyss yawning beneath him. A tube containing their names, the story of the climb, and small personal effects, was left at the top to substantiate their claim. They wild down the dangerous part of the pinnacle by means of a rope which could not be disengaged and still remains on the peak.

Imposition Upon Invalids.
The health board of New York has discovered that in several instances bakers have been turning out bread labeled "Genuine Gluten for Diabetics," which has been found to contain a high percentage of starch and which had been colored to give the appearance of the genuine article. It has been ordered that gluten bread must be 100 per cent gluten or the offending bakers will be prosecuted.
