

FARM LEGISLATION TO WAIT

President Coolidge Says Farmers Can Wait For Consideration

Many favorable comments have been received by the Sherman County Observer on the article printed last week comparing the prospective abilities of Frederick Steiwer and Bert E. Haney for the position of United States senator from Oregon, one of whom is to be elected this fall to that position.

Newspaper dispatches under date of September 21st state that President Coolidge has returned from his vacation from official duties and is again back in the White House with a serene mind that is not burdened with affairs of state. The article goes on to state that "except for the farm situation, which the administration believes is far from acute, there is scarcely anything of great importance to trouble the president's mind today. The much heralded prosperity, Mr. Coolidge believes, is a panacea for most all ills and remedial legislation need not be hurried."

Under these circumstances farmers need not expect to receive any consideration from President Coolidge, not from anyone elected to national office who is pledged in advance to first consider President Coolidge's state of mind before proposing remedial legislation.

This is the attitude we understand that Frederick Steiwer has taken and will take if elected to be United States senator from Oregon. Therefore farmers can continue to grow crops at a loss and continue to borrow money with which to pay debts incurred in the operation of their farms.

Bert Haney, on the other hand, is pledged to do all in his official capacity that he is able to secure national legislation that will relieve the farmer's burden and be to some degree comparable to that now being given to railroads through an increase in freight rates when ever necessary to permit them to earn money above operating costs and to union labor through restricted immigration.

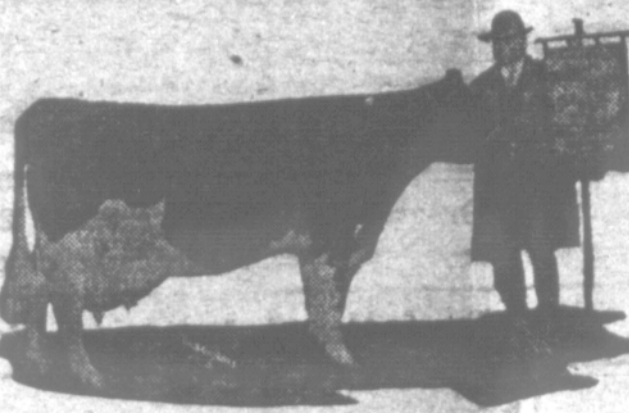

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The largest timber deal made at Marshfield in years was completed between the Western White Cedar company and the Stout Lumber company, involving delivery of 40,000,000 feet of white cedar logs to the Western White Cedar company within the next two years.

A \$30,000 hotel, six stories high, 100x112 feet, containing 125 rooms, will be constructed in Baker within the next year, it was announced by representatives of a group of eastern capitalists.

The state game commission has created a 2500-acre game preserve at Alford station, north of Harrisburg, on the Pacific highway. Chinese pheasants will be liberated on the new refuge this fall.

The Silver Creek Placer corporation of Merlin, Josephine county, has filed application with the state engineer covering the appropriation of water from Silver, Rawhide, Little Rawhide and Lake creeks for mining purposes. The cost of the development was estimated at \$10,000.

One thousand dollars in transportation money was appropriated by the Oregon State Fair board to guarantee the attendance of approximately a dozen uniformed drum corps and bands on American Legion and Boosters day at the state fair at Salem, Friday, October 1.

Hay from only two counties in Oregon—Malheur and Baker—was considered in connection with plans for a quarantine on hay shipments from certain counties in Oregon, Idaho, California, Wyoming, Colorado and Nevada, to prevent entry into Montana of the alfalfa weevil, it is said.

USE AND ABUSE OF SUGAR

Medical Men Claim Too Much Is Dangerous To Health

The use of sugar in a person's diet depends upon the individual's requirement. Certain it is that the tendency today is to use sugar in too many kinds of food. Its legitimate use is to make things palatable which otherwise would not be so and to provide a ready or quick form of energy. But the natural flavor of grain and the mild flavor of fruit should not be concealed by the addition of large quantities of sugar.

In estimating the place of any food in the diet, we must consider its contribution toward nourishment. Has it any deficiencies? Will an unlimited or even liberal use of it likely make the diet one-sided or unbalanced in any way? Our body has certain nutritive requirements which can be met only through food. One of these requirements is a supply of energy sufficient to carry on the life processes. Food must furnish energy for growth and energy for work. It also must supply enough tissue-building material of the right sort. Certain vitamins and minerals are necessary, and we require both dilution and bulk or roughage in order to keep our machine running properly. After the period of early infancy, when mother's milk is the natural and best food possible, we find that no one food will meet all the requirements of adequate diet. Hence the importance of understanding the limitations and advantages of the many different kinds of food.

The substance that is called sugar which is the same whether manufactured from sugar cane or from beets was, until recently, too expensive to be used by large numbers of people. Since the invention of machinery, with its subsequent great increase in sugar production and decrease in cost, there has been most rapid growth in its consumption.

Sugar is a one-sided article of diet. It is simply a fuel food. We must remember, however, that there are many other foods that serve the same purpose. Starches and fats are fuel foods. There are other forms of sugar which occur in combinations of milk, fruit, honey, corn, etc., and most of these contain other useful substances besides sugar.

Whether the eating of an excessive amount of sugar is the direct cause of any disease or not is not yet fully understood. It is well known that a diabetic is unable to use sugar unless he is treated with insulin, but it does not follow that the eating of sugar may produce the disease. However, in the absence of proof on such a point, moderation at least is indicated. The normal individual can handle three to four ounces of sugar per day without ill effects. Overweight people should use sugar sparingly as sugar is a fat former. The body can manufacture its own sugar from bread, cereals, fruit and vegetables. We need have no concern whatever about supplying it ourselves.

The Inman Lumber & Development company, incorporated to carry on business at Port Orford, where it has taken a 50-year lease upon the wharf of the port of Port Orford, has started a crew of men to work preparing a camp at the proposed location of its first dam at the mouth of Rock creek, a tributary of Elk river.

Despite the heavy prune losses in Marion county, due to rats, the pack will be normal, according to W. F. Drager, Salem prune packer. Mr. Drager estimated the pack for the district at between 60,000,000 and 70,000,000 pounds. Approximately 42,000,000 pounds of the pack already has been sold or is under contract.

September 23 is the last day on which the secretary of state is authorized to receive arguments and photographic cuts for publication in the voters' pamphlet for the November election, according to announcement at the state department. Printing of the pamphlets will get under way by September 28, the secretary of state said. Approximately 280,000 of these pamphlets will be printed.

Tracts of valuable timber land aggregating 18,616 acres in all have been added to Whitman national forest in Oregon by executive proclamation issued by President Coolidge. The additions to the forest, all of which were made from public land acreage now under control of the department of the interior, includes timber in Grant, Union and Baker counties abutting the present borders of the park on three sides.

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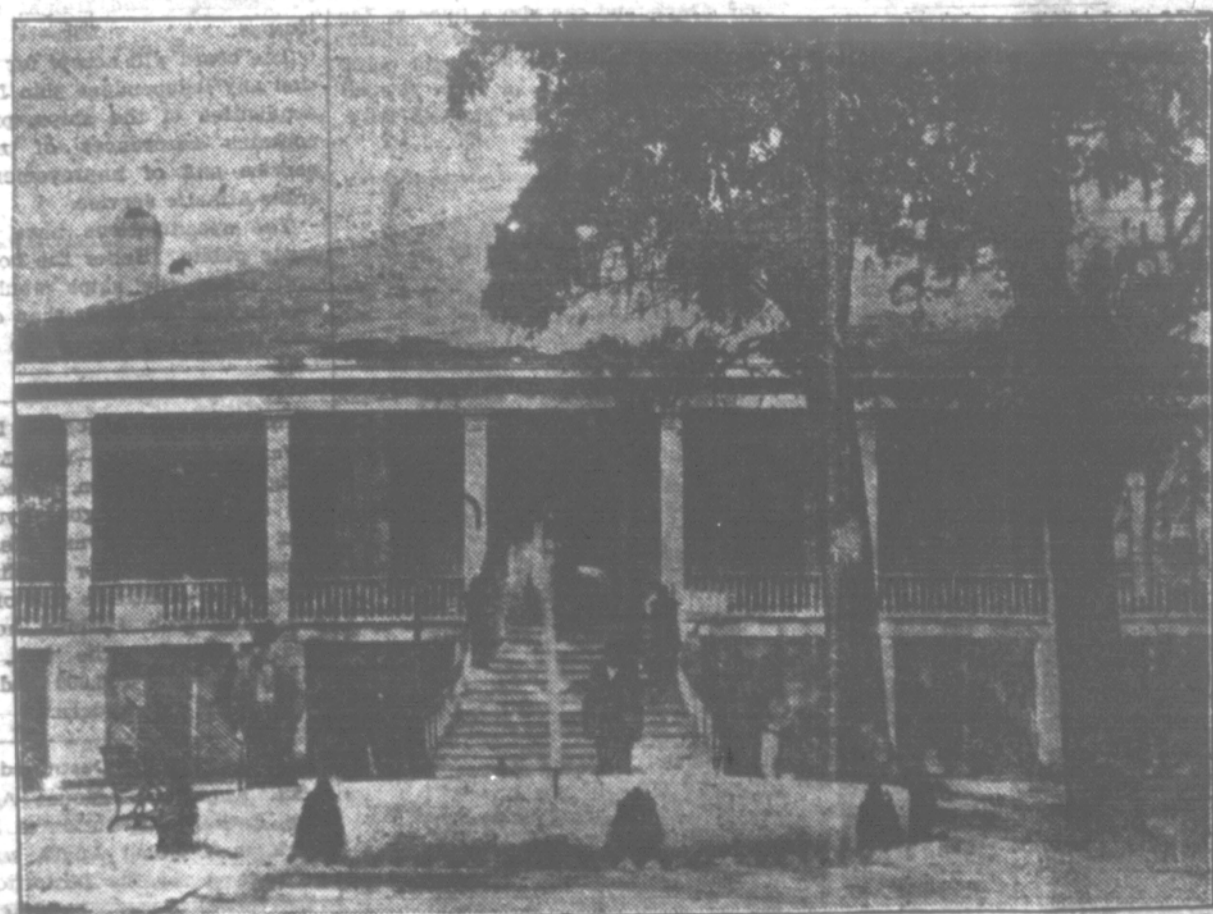

JEFF DAVIS HOME NOW TOURIST'S MECCA

Beauvoir, the home of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America, which has long been preserved as a Southern shrine between Gulfport and Biloxi, Miss., by the state of Mississippi and the Daughters of the Confederacy, is now one of the winter tourist mecca's on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. The old colonial home of the leader of the "lost cause" adjoins the home for old soldiers of the Confederacy and is zealously looked after by the old men. It is surrounded by spreading moss hung oaks and magnolias, and faces the waters of the Gulf of Mexico. It was in this house that Davis spent his days after the war between the states, writing "The Rise and Fall of the Confederacy." Assurances have been made that the historic old mansion will be perpetuated and that the real estate fever, which has seized the Mississippi Coast will not be allowed to touch it.
