Oregon has reported 195,641 vehicle registrations to the bureau of public roads in Washington, D. C., for the first six months of the present year, an increase of 3 per cent over the same period of 1925.

The golden eagle, which was released recently by the Oregon Humane society after being in captivity at Ames automobile camp on the Pacific highway, a few miles north of Salem, for several months, has returned to its old haunts near Stayton and resumed its depredations.

The only known relatives of Ashton Galloway who was killed on the Sherman highway last week, when he fell from a truck, is a mother living in Virginia. Earl T. Jones has been appointed administrator of the estate.

Dr. Wonderlick announces the removal of his office into the apartments connected with his residence in the Burres house next to the Wasco News Enterprise. In making this change the convenience of the public as well as of the doctor has been taken into consideration as it will be easier to give office treatments day or night

About 26 ladies attended the Woman's Missionary society meeting Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. R. C. Byers. Among the number were ten visitors. Four new members joined the society during the business session. All present enjoyed the very interesting program. Refreshments consisting of brick ice cream, cake and coffee were served.

M. R. Schadewitz, C. R. Morrison, L. V. Moore and Arthur Smith returned last Sunday from a weeks hunting in the Paulina mountains south of Prineville. They brought back with them two deer that were shot by members of the party. Part of the venison came to the editor's table through the courtesy of Mr. Schadewitz, about as tender deer meat as we have ever sampled.

Growth of Eugene was rapid during the month between August 21 and September 21, if the number of new telephones installed in the city in that time is a criterion. The net increase in telephone users during the period was 212.

An order placing upon the ballot at the general election in Lane county November 2, the question of issuing \$75,000 bonds as Lane county's share of the cost of constructing a bridge across the Willamette river at Springfield, was made by the county court.

There were four fatalities due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending September 23, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Erwin Arnold, Portland, choker setter; Dan Novak, Portland, powder man; William J. Schultz, Portland, rigger; and Frank Brown, Burns, contractor. A total of 994 accidents was reported.

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SHERMAN ELECTRIC CO. SOLD TO PACIFIC POWER CO.

The consummation of a deal involving approximately \$92,000 was effected this week when Pacific Power & Light Co. took over the Sherman Electric company as a subsidiary to its already large organization.

The Sherman Electric Co. has been serving the towns of Wasco, Moro and Grass Valley in Sherman county and in this connection represents an addition to the Pacific Power & Light Co. of about 1,000 customers. The purchase was in the neighborhood of 80 per cent of the outstanding stock. A period of three weeks has been given stockholders in which to turn over their stock to the purchasing company at the figures quoted the original group. The purchase price was a little over the par value of the stock, or \$107 a share.

It is said that no changes are contemplated in the management of the two divisions. The Sherman Electric Co. organization will continue as at present constituted until extensions of the lines are made that will hook up this county with Gilliam and Morrow counties and districts further east where the Pacific Power & Light Co. have had electric power lines for a number of years.

Fees received by the secretary of state from motor vehicle registrations during the period January 1, 1926, to September 15, 1926, aggregated \$5,888,863.21, according to a statement issued by the state department at Salem. Of the total registrations 294,884 were passenger cars and commercial vehicles of less than one ton capacity, 17,264 were trucks and trailers, 2105 were motorcycles, 14,031 were chauffeurs, 691 dealers and 399,793 motor vehicle operators.

The crew of the Jetty Sands Seining company was ejected forcibly from the sand spit west of the Fort Stevens military reservation by armed soldiers from the garrison at the fort. The soldiers, commanded by Lieutenant F. R. Chambers, placed W. L. Pulliam, superintendent of the seining company, in custody. The move on the part of the military forces was ordered by Captain E. R. Percy, commanding the coast defenses of the Columbia river, on instructions from the war department, which contends that the seining ground is part of the military reservation.
