STATE ORGANIZER HERE

State Grange Units Being Organized in Sherman County

Many of the prominent farmers over Sherman county are assisting in getting the grange organized and started in this county, feeling that there is a need for more thorough organization of the rural people. Shearers grange in the Buckley district has been the only organization functioning here for some time. This grange owns their own hall and are making arrangements to have it dedicated by state grange officials in the near future. The grange is the oldest of rural organizations having been started by members of the U. S. agricultural department in 1867 and has been in continuous existence, five years more than twenty others have failed and is stronger today than ever in its history. W. R. Gekeler was called to other parts of the state to attend meetings, once to attend the fifty-third anniversary of a grange and again to attend a homecoming of the first grange ever organized by him some 18 years ago. Preliminary work has been started on several organizations in this county. Mr. Gekeler and other deputies will be in the county again the first of November to complete the work.

Close to thirty farmers in the Rutledge district and around Grass Valley have already united with the recently organized grange and temporary officers have been appointed. The majority voted in favor of having the organization perfected; however, at Grass Valley as more farmers could be reached. The meeting on the 16th was well attended and after the preliminary work in getting the grange under way a social good time was enjoyed. J. J. Wiley has been named temporary chairman, and a committee to assist in the work of arranging for the next meeting were Ed Alley, E. R. Blaylock, Mrs. Jess Martin, Mrs. D. L. Reynolds and Mrs. L. K. Smith. The meeting to complete the work and elect the regular officers will be held in Grass Valley on November 11, when State Deputy W. R. Gekeler will be in the county again and will also assist in getting other new organizations started, and in perfecting a county organization.
