

STATE BOOKS FOR COUNTY

BRANCH LIBRARY PLACED AT ARLINGTON

Residents of Sherman county will be given an opportunity to make full use of the state library during the next month when Miss Jane Dustin, representing the library, will spend several days in the county loaning books and discussing the state service with local people.

Miss Dustin was in Sherman county the past week-end. Friday afternoon she met with members of the Moro Womens Club and Saturday she was in Wasco making arrangements for a return visit. She spent Monday in Arlington, Tuesday in Condon and Wednesday in Heppner. It is her plan to revisit this territory and include also Jefferson county in the course of her work. A regular branch of the state library will probably be established in Arlington for the next few weeks, and the field worker will make that her headquarters, traveling out to other points from there. This work is a part of a general extension program being carried on this fall in those counties which are entirely or partially dependent on the state library at Salem for book service.

The state library worker is eager for every person in Sherman, Gilliam, Jefferson and Morrow counties to know about the various phases of service which the state institution can offer to its patrons. Books are loaned to any person in the state of Oregon for a four week period, transportation only being paid by the borrower. Special collections of books on desired subjects will be loaned to clubs, schools, granges or other organizations for an extended period of time. Any community may have a traveling library, a 50-unit book collection, for six months. At the expiration of that period the books are exchanged for a new library, and in this way a community may have a constant supply of state library books. Transportation is the only charge.

Lists of books on special subjects will be supplied upon request, and study courses will be outlined for individuals or groups.

Miss Dustin will meet with local library boards in towns where there are reading rooms. She will work with high schools in the interest of their libraries, and she is especially interested in meeting women's clubs and parent-teacher organizations. Any such group which would like to schedule her for a meeting during the next month should write her at Arlington at once. She has been constantly doing organization work the past few months, and is urging groups to take this opportunity to make a start toward building up local library services in their respective communities.

The complete schedule of places and dates which will be visited will be announced later. Meanwhile local people desiring a special meeting or information should notify Miss Dustin so that she can make arrangements accordingly.

Other counties which have received this personal library service from the state library this fall are: Grant, Wheeler, Walla, Harney and Lake counties.

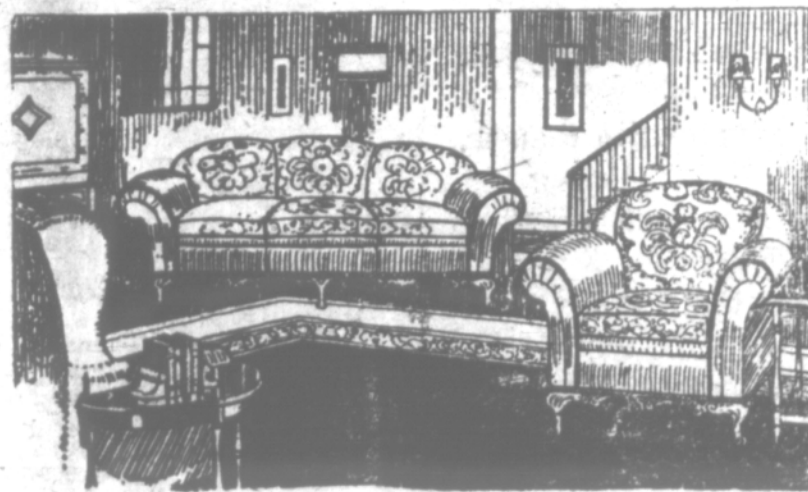

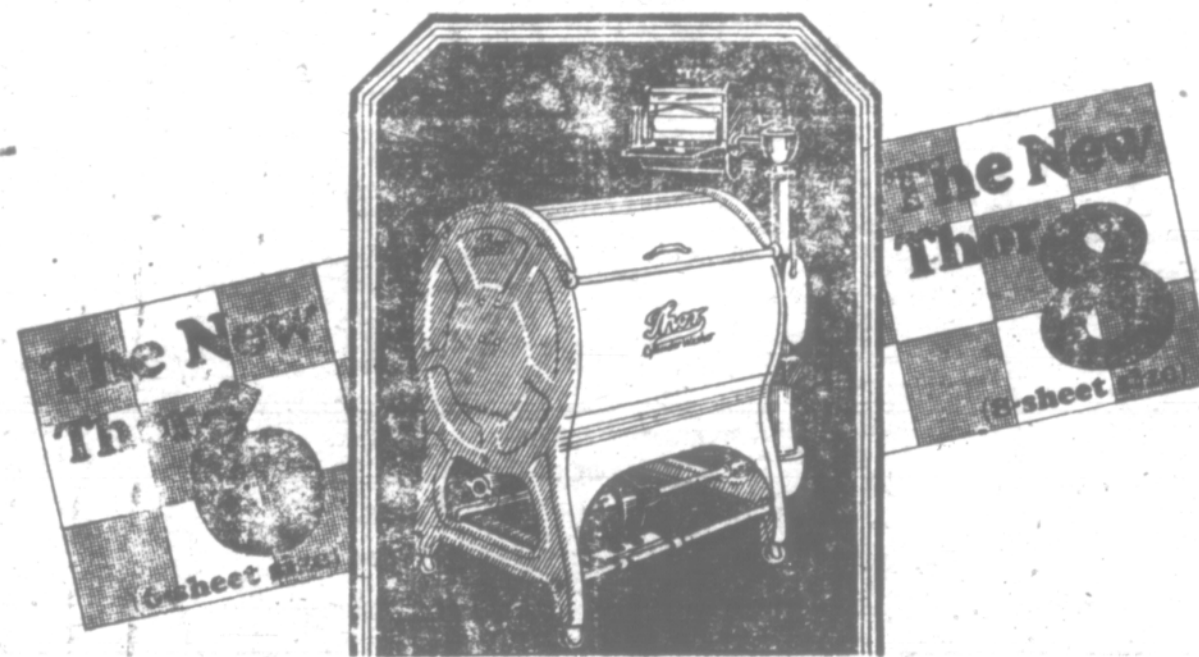
