

INTERESTING MEETING HELD

Wasco Women's Club Entertains Clubs of Three Counties

The federated clubs of Hood River, Wasco and Sherman counties held a very successful and instructive institute November 12 at the Methodist church in Wasco.

Mrs. Hugh White, president of the hostess club, opened the meeting, and Mrs. Seidie Orr-Dunbar, past president of the state federation conducted discussions. Personal responsibility of club members was the subject of the talk given by Mrs. Castner of Hood River. She asked that club members be broad enough to see each other's point of view, leaving out all bitterness in doing club work, that they be good winners as well as good losers, and that they answer all appeals of the general federation.

Mrs. Crandall of The Dalles Sorosis club continued speaking along the lines of personal development, also giving the origin of Sorosis and history of women's clubs. Miss Nina Moran of The Dalles discussed official responsibility of members from a business woman's standpoint, stressing system, management, and ability to meet all demands.

Mrs. John Searcy, of the Moro club gave a most interesting and able talk on the relation of the club to the community. She spoke of what Moro had done and what all clubs may do in sponsoring juvenile activities, in the Camp Fire girl and in the Boy Scout movements, besides the limitless work along lines of library work, controlling vicious motion pictures and obnoxious magazines.

In considering the points brought up by the speakers, Mrs. Dunbar urged the keeping of a card index of the likes and abilities of each member of a club. She warned the program committees of the danger of making the year's work too local and the secretaries of the troubles arising from incorrect minutes. Vacation Bible schools and jury service for women were discussed favorably also.

Mrs. Beth Bailey McLean, nutrition expert and chairman of Hood River's American Home department, gave a very interesting talk on the aims and purposes of the American Home department. This department of club work, under official recognition of the economic value of women as wage earners, is the home. The subject is divided into (a) Division of home economics, teaching cooperation with teachers in our high schools; (b) Study of nutrition and of textiles; (c) Home extension, and (d) Finance, including insurance and the budget. Mrs. Bailey's text, book, Meal Planning and Table Service, is being used in some of our state schools.

SHORT CIRCUIT COURT TERM

November term of circuit court had a hard time to complete one judicial day before lack of gavel compelled Judge Parker to adjourn the regular term of November court until time to again convene the May term next year.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. Randall, indicted for issuing a check without sufficient funds in the bank, was soon ended when Randall entered a plea of guilty. He was sentenced to serve a six months term and was paroled on the understanding that either the check was to be made good or he be forced to serve the sentence.

A Vogel was also before the court on an indictment charging assault and battery. He entered a plea of guilty and claimed extenuating circumstances. Judge Parker pronounced a fine of \$50, which was paid.

Several additional matters came before the grand jury and are held for further consideration and action.

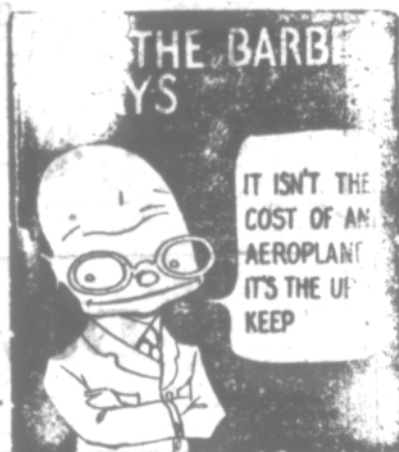
