"BEN HUR" AT THE DALLES CIVIC AUDITORIUM

"Ben Hur", the splendid picturization of General Lew Wallace's widely read novel of the same name, will be presented at the auditorium, The Dalles, on Sunday evening, December 12, at 8:30 for an engagement of one night.

"Ben Hur" is being shown in New York, where it is now in the tenth month of its engagement, and in ten other cities of the east and middle west. All of these presentations are made by specially organized units including orchestra and the picture is shown only in legitimate dramatic theatres.

"Ben Hur", which is recognized as the greatest masterpiece so far achieved in the art of the cinema, was directed by Fred Niblo and was made in California and in Italy. Among the chief players were Ramon Novarro, Francis X. Bushman, May McAvoy, Claire McDowell, Kathleen Key, Carmel Meyers, Nigel de Bruin, Mitchell Lewis, Leo White, Frank Currier, Charles Belcher, Betty Bronson, Dale Fuller and Winter Hall. The glory of the picture, however, rises far above the personalities of this fine group of artists. The scenes of the marine battle between the Roman galleys and the triremes of Greek pirates; the chariot race in the Circus Maximus, in which twelve teams of Arabian horses take part; the cosmopolitan crowds at the Jappa gate of Jerusalem; the procession of the first Palm, Sunday and the assemblage of soldiers under Ben Hur for the purpose of rescuing the Saviour from the Romans — these are scenes of the most brilliant beauty and stirring action. Beyond its purely pictorial interest the cinema engages the interest of beholders by reason of its exquisite love story; its accuracy and the reality that it lends to the most important period in the history of mankind.

"Ben Hur" in its present form is as great a contribution to American art as was the novel, which reached the widest circulation ever attained by work of fiction, and the play which for a quarter of a century delighted American and English play-goers. The cinema has never performed a finer mission than in bringing "Ben Hur" to the screen.

OREGON VITAL STATISTICS

Marriages Increase and Divorces Decrease Years 1924-25

The United States department of commerce announces that, according to the returns received, there were 6,989 marriages performed in Oregon during the year 1925, as compared with 6,967 in 1924, representing an increase of 22, or 0.3 per cent. This increase, however, is slightly less than the estimated increase in the population.

During the year 1925 there were 2,886 divorces in the state, as compared with 2,945 in 1924, representing a decrease of 59 or 2 per cent.

The estimated population of the state of Oregon on July 1, 1925, was 363,064, and on July 1, 1924, 349,179. On the basis of these estimates, the number of marriages per 1,000 of the population was 3.34 in 1925, as against 3.47 in 1924.

The number of marriages was furnished by the state board of health and the number of divorces by the county clerk of each county. The figures for Sherman are: marriages in 1925, 26; in 1924, 23; divorces in 1925, 6 and in 1924, 3.

ANTHONY EUWER

Second Lyceum Number Comes Here December 9th

As a beauty, I'm not a great star. There are others more handsome, by far. But my face — I don't mind it, because I'm behind it — It's the folks in the front that I jar.

Probably no limerick that has ever been written has been quoted so universally as this little five-line masterpiece which we quote above. Orators, authors, preachers, statesmen, actors and humorists of all descriptions have taken refuge behind it and evoked the responsive plaudits of their audiences. It was the favorite limerick of President Wilson, and has been many times accredited to him. Since it was written it has found its way into countless newspapers, periodicals and books. It has come to be regarded as the limerick par excellence.

Anthony Euwer, the real and only author of this limerick, to speak sociologically is an inhabitant of North America. He was ushered into this world previous to the Johnstown flood and not very far above the Mason and Dixon line. As an artist he is the original 3-in-1 combination, for he is a writer, and an illustrator of his own writings — then he steps upon the platform and entertains his audience delightfully with these same rhymes — the dream children of his own creation.

Many widely quoted whimsical verses and nonsense jingles attribute their authorship to him. He is the author of "Christopher Cricket on Cats" which has become a classic of feline frivolity. When Mr. Euwer appeared as an entertainer on the English lyceum course in 1911, this book was reviewed, quoted, and its deliciously quaint drawings reproduced in a number of British periodicals, while columnists on our own journals have never ceased to draw on this treasury of ingenious wisdom for their "fillers." In 1913 Collier's published a series of his anatomical limericks with drawings. Later these five-line mauler bullets were published under the comprehensive title of "The Limeratomy." The key-note of the "Limeratomy" was struck in the verse which accompanies the cover drawing:

"When you've bats in your belfry that flut,
When your comprenez-vous rope is cut,
When there's nobody home
In the top of your dome,
Then your head's not a head — it's a nut!"

It was in 1913 that Anthony Euwer made his first trip to the Oregon country, and in the fall of 1916 appeared "Rhymes of our Valley" — our valley being the beautiful Hood River valley famed the world over for its apples. The publication of this book immediately marked him as a producer of that big, gripping, red-blooded, human stuff that stirs men's souls. And there was tenderness in his lines and an irresistible humor in his philosophy that made certain of our critics sit up and rub their eyes. It was not long before his association with the Oregon country was likened to the histories of those old pioneers — Joaquin Miller of the Californias, and James Whitcomb Riley of the Hoosiers, and Robert W. Service of Yukon.

As a platform personality, it has been said by those in a position to speak, that Anthony Euwer stands out as "one of three" author-readers in America today. As he creates a picture when he paints in color — and he is a painter, by the way, of no mean ability — so too does he create them when he paints with a spoken word; and if he has found humor in a calf's antics or pathos in the plaint of a little runt pig, or nobility in a man or loveliness in a woman, if he has found these things along the way you, also, are going to find them with him.

Good taste is better than fine clothes. It carries one further toward success.
