WHO PROFITS MOST

To show the close relationship be-
tween the farmer, the laborer, manu-
facturing and the tariff, it is only nec-
essary to analyze the problems in-
volved in producing an article such as
sugar.

Who is the greatest beneficiary of
a reasonable tariff which permits the
development of a domestic beet sugar
industry in competition with foreign
supplies? Is it the farmer, the manu-
facturer or the laborer?

Without a tariff, sugar would occa-
sionally be a cent or two a pound
cheaper in times of overproduction
when cheap-labor foreign supplies
could be dumped on this market—
thus ruining the domestic industry.
The same argument applies to all in-
dustries which need an equitable tar-
iff to enable them to compete on an
equal basis with foreign supplies in
our home markets.

The tariff is not a political issue,
but a highly technical industrial prob-
lem and, in passing, is the McNary-
Haugen crop control measure.
