Sunshine And Outside Air

Prevention and Treatment of Disease
Aided by Their Use

"That all life has been and is dependent on the sun as it goes on thru the ages emitting radiant energy has been known for a long time, but one of the most remarkable discoveries of the twentieth century is the fact that this light is very important in promoting physical development and more perfect nutrition in growing children, and in restoring health to diseased children and adults. This discovery was made chiefly through the study of rickets, a nutritional disease of children whose diet is not properly balanced. In this disease the bones grow but do not become hardened and the results are weakness in muscles, discomfort, and a tendency for the bones to become bent, resulting in bowlegs, knock-knees, sunken chest etc. This condition, extremely common in North America and most of middle Europe, is due largely to the lack of exposure to outdoor sunlight thus depriving the body of the benefit of certain short rays called ultra-violet rays.

"The importance of the rays is seen from certain experiments. Chickens kept from hatching-time indoors in an airy room but without direct illumination remained stunted and infirm in appearance, while a group of similar age kept under the same conditions and on the same food but allowed out of doors in the sunlight each day developed into perfectly normal birds.

"Sunshine and outside air have proved their worth as important aids in the prevention and treatment of many forms of tuberculosis. Pure sunshine has given the best results, but in cloudy weather and in fall and winter when the number of hours of sunshine are fewer, sunlight lamps have become excellent substitutes.

"It has become a common practice to expose children and adults to these sunlight lamps. But there is the danger in doing this without having the direction and careful supervision of a physician; first, in over-exposing the body; second, in the possibility of attempting to treat diseases which are not responsive to light and which, when properly diagnosed by a physician could be cured by other means; third, in employing light alone as the means of curing any form of tuberculosis while sacrificing the much more important parts of the treatment such as rest, favorable hygienic conditions, good food, etc. Many patients have come to tuberculosis resorts as far advanced consumptives because they tried to be cured by light exposures alone — some having so treated themselves, and others, unfortunately, having been so advised by physicians who did not insist on the most important curative agent, rest.

"Light at best is only an aid in the treatment of tuberculosis of all forms but when properly used, it is an important one. During the warmer months of the year, children and even adults should be playing in the sunshine wearing as little clothing as convention will allow. A thorough bronzing of the skin during the summer would be a benefit to most of us whether strong or delicate. Exposure should be gradual so as to acquire tan without excessive sunburn."

An Unwise Experiment

Few pieces of legislation passed in recent years have been more impractical than the law requiring the Interstate Commerce Commission to determine the valuation of railroad property. Congress and the people were assured that the total cost would not exceed \$10,000,000, and could be accomplished in about three years.

Already 13 years have elapsed and the cost exceeds \$120,000,000 with only tentative valuations effected on less than three-fourths of the total mileage. By the time the tentative valuation is completed, the railroads will have been practically rebuilt; which means that for any practical purpose the valuation is worthless, and \$120,000,000 wasted, about \$28,000,000 of which falls directly and the balance indirectly on the public.

At the time the valuation bill was proposed, economists of recognized ability throughout the country said it would serve no purpose, in that the time required to make the valuation even tentatively would be so long that at the end it would have to be started over again and continue in this manner, owing to progressive expenditures for improvements, betterments and extensions.

Authors of the bill may have meant well, but that in no way compensates the public for the waste of money occasioned.

"Gas" Tax In Many States

Gasoline tax has been adopted by 45 of the 48 states in the union. The three states that have not accepted such a tax, Illinois, Massachusetts and New Jersey, rely on their large automobile registrations for highway funds. Kentucky and South Carolina have adopted the highest tax, 5 cents a gallon. The next highest tax is that in Virginia, 4 1/2 cents. Five states have a 4-cent tax and nine a 3-cent tax. By far the greatest number use the 2-cent per gallon tax. In addition to the gas tax, every state reports a motor vehicle fee which ranges from \$8 for the average sized car in California to \$84 for the same type of car in Oregon.

Historic City Entertains

State Convention Christian Endeavor
Will Convene Next Thursday
at Oregon City

The coming state Christian Endeavor convention, to be held in Oregon City April 21-24, is looked forward to by many young people as an event of great importance. Mr. E. F. Gates of Boston, Massachusetts, general secretary of the United Society of Christian Endeavor, is thinking enough of its importance to make this convention his main objective in a long transcontinental trip. Three one-day institutes in California just preceding the convention are incidental to his good-will trip to Oregon, to show that he and his fellow officers have an interest in this state and have not forgotten the west since having come out here to the International Christian Endeavor convention in Portland in 1925. Mr. Gates was educated to be a lawyer and still is a member of the bar in Washington, D. C. He is recognized everywhere as a man of great ability and is much sought after for convention speeches in the United States and Canada.

Oregon City is an interesting and historic place. It is said to be the oldest city west of the Rocky Mountains. One of the first plots of San Francisco is on file in the court house in Oregon City. It is the birth place of Edwin Markham, the noted poet, though the house in which he was born has long since disappeared. Dr. John McLoughlin, pioneer in the northwest, is buried here. His house stands on another location, converted into a museum of historical interest. Kipling while on a visit to this vicinity fished in the Clackamas just north of the city. The city is situated on the Willamette river, the natural falls of which now furnish power for street cars, paper mills, and a nationally advertised woolen mill.

Oregon City residents are making ready to welcome the hosts of Christian Endeavorers who will come to the convention, which begins next Thursday evening and continues thru until Saturday night. Lodging and breakfast will be furnished free on the Harvard plan to those who pay the registration fee of one dollar. Southern Pacific train service, and electric trolley cars from Portland make it easy of access to Oregon City.

Other speakers include: Mrs. Chas. W. Williams of Portland, Dr. Norman K. Tully of Salem, Rev. Paul C. Brown of Los Angeles, Dr. J. B. Hunley of Walla Walla, Miss Louella Dyer of Seattle, Rev. S. Earl DuBois of Portland, Mr. Ernest W. Peterson of Portland, and Mr. B. F. Irvine of Portland, president, will preside.

Safe Guard Wild Fowl

Sportsmen Asked to Cooperate in
Upholding Shooting Restrictions
in Western States

To safeguard the future supply of wild fowl of the western states requires that increased restrictions be placed on hunting privileges. This statement was made recently by Dr. E. W. Nelson, chief of the biological survey, United States department of agriculture, in discussing the probable nature of the amendments to the migratory bird treaty act regulations that may soon be submitted by the department to the president for promulgation.

In making this statement, Doctor Nelson calls upon all sportsmen to cooperate with the department in any action that it may take in restricting the annual number of wild ducks and other migratory game birds that may be taken by hunters. He stresses the seriousness of the wild-fowl situation in the Rocky mountain and Pacific coast states, one that may continue with no permanent improvement until conditions can be remedied in the Bear River marshes, Utah, the Lower Klamath lake, California, and Malheur lake, Oregon. This must be done to give the birds sufficient fresh water to combat the alkali poisoning resulting from their congregating in very limited areas. Until these areas can be restored as healthful wild fowl feeding and resting grounds the birds will have difficulty in holding their own. Temporarily improved conditions coming from a wet winter like the present, said Doctor Nelson, can not immediately bring back the birds to normal numbers. Only by building up the breeding stock and providing the essentials for the welfare of the birds can the badly depleted ranks be restored sufficiently to allow again the good shooting formerly enjoyed by sportsmen in many parts of the range of these birds.

It is for this reason that sportsmen are urged to cooperate with the department of agriculture in the observance of any restrictions that it may feel it necessary to make temporarily in their former shooting privileges. Doctor Nelson makes it clear that administration of the federal bird law and any changes in the regulations are purely for the purpose of trying to maintain and build up our supply of wild fowl against increasingly adverse conditions, and that once this is accomplished the regulations are subject to changes in accordance with improved conditions. The cooperation of sportsmen is greatly desired as the success to be gained in restoring our wild fowl in the west will depend largely upon the willingness of sportsmen to cooperate in the task.

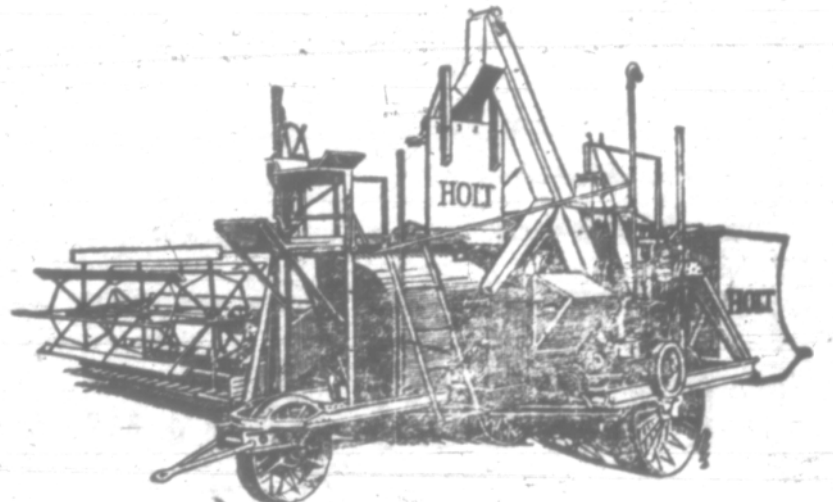
