High School Girl Wins

Portland Student Awarded First
Prize in Fourth Annual Meat
Story Contest

Miss Gwendolyn Stuart, Portland,
Oregon, high school girl, has won the
championship of the state in the
fourth annual meat story contest.
Her story was selected by a commit-
tee of prominent home economics
women as the best of the many sub-
mitted in the state and also placed 5th
in the entire western district com-
prising twelve states. This announce-
ment was made today by the Na-
tional Live Stock and Meat Board,
sponsor of the contest.

Miss Stuart is a sophomore in the
Jefferson high school. The title of
her story was "Meat — Its History
and Uses." More than 13,500 high
school girls from every state are said
to have competed.

Miss Dorothy Drake of Yakima,
Washington, was declared champion
of the western district. A story by
Rose Schmidt of Moorestown, N. J.,
won the national championship. Prizes
in the contest included university
scholarships and cash.

Dr. P. Mabel Nelson, head of the
foods and nutrition department of
Iowa State College, was chairman of
the judging committee. Other mem-
bers were Miss Genevieve A. Callahan,
associate editor, Better Homes and
Gardens, Miss Alice M. Child, assistant
professor of home economics, Uni-
versity of Minnesota, and Mrs.
Caroline B. King, woman's editor,
The Country Gentleman.

High school home economics teach-
ers cooperate annually in carrying
forward the national meat story con-
test for their students. The pro-
ject has proved of exceptional merit
as a means of stimulating interest in
home economics class work. The
present day importance attached to
this study makes the contest doubly
valuable, it is said.

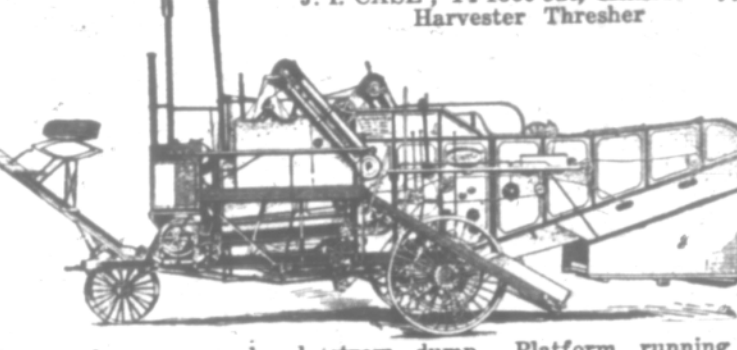
