A detour was built on the sidehill

ized insurance on his growing grain  
north of Moro for an estimated yield  
of 35 bushels for 215 acres. The  
insurance was placed with J. C. Mc-  
Kean, who said it was the first time  
he had handled grain insurance for  
35 bushels an acre during his seven  
years business experience in Sherman  
county, 30 bushel yields being the  
largest estimate that had been han-  
dled by him in former years. Mr.  
Strong stated that six years ago the  
same lands had produced 17 sacks  
to the acre and that the conditions  
were better this year than six years  
ago.

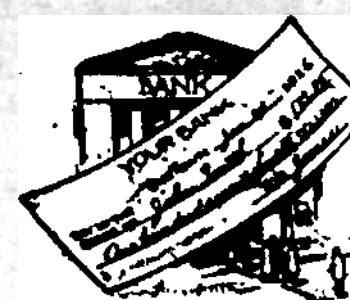

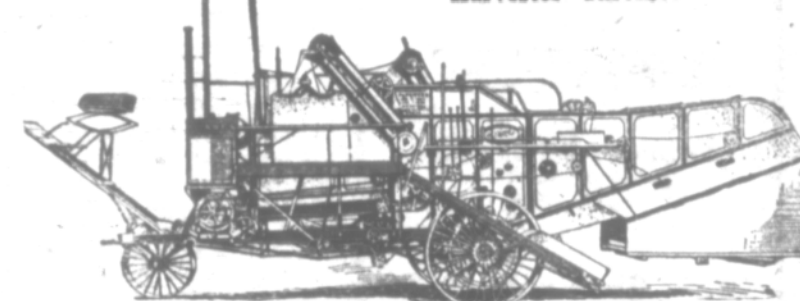
