Wasco Postoffice Robbed

The postoffice at Wasco was broken into and robbed Wednesday night for the third time since W. E. Tate has been in charge of the office. The safe was blown open, but it is not known at this time just how much loss the effort caused the Wasco postoffice, nor at what time the burglars operated. The lobby of the office has been kept open to the public all day and all night for the past several years.

Cloud Burst at Arlington

Late Sunday afternoon a cloud burst struck six miles south of Arlington at the Smith sheep corrals, half of the water running off by way of Rock creek into the John Day river and half going north through the streets of Arlington.

The Vendome hotel was partly wrecked, the rear end being torn off; two residences were washed off their foundations by the eight-foot wall of water that went through the town. Four automobiles were caught by the water in the streets and buried among the debris.

A 40-foot fill, about 80 feet long, was washed out on the west edge of town, on the Columbia highway, as was a second place where the John Day and Columbia highways join at the south end of town, to a depth of about 20 feet.

No lives were reported lost as a result of the storm, due mainly to warning given by a motorist who raced the flood into Arlington. Basements of business houses on the main street were flooded with consequent loss of stocks of merchandise.

Poor Students Dismissed

One hundred forty-nine students "flunked" out of the University of Oregon during the school year 1926-27, it was revealed in figures announced this week at the registrar's office. A wedding process of the first two terms of the year had so reduced the number of academic laggards that in the spring term just ended, the "flunkers" numbered less than half those of the fall term.

Spring flunks numbered 30—25 men and 5 women. Seventeen men and one woman failed to make the five hours required for freshmen or seven hours required for members of the three upper classes. Five men and three women were dropped under the 17-hour rule imposed upon probationers, and three men and one woman were flunked because of failure to meet special requirements imposed by the scholastic committee in their individual cases.

The year's figures show a decided advantage for women students. Of the 149 who flunked out, there were 124 men and 25 women. This ratio was approximated in each of the terms. Illustrating the drop in the number of flunks as the year progressed the following figures are given:

Fall term, 65 flunks; winter term, 64; spring term, 30.
