### Items of General News Concerning Wasco

Mrs. Bertha Holland spent the 4th of July weekend with her mother, Mrs. Kune, at Sisters, Oregon.

Albert Medler, former resident of Wasco, is very ill in The Dalles at the home of his sister, Mrs. E. E. Barnum.

Mr. and Mrs. Ross Muir left for Portland Friday to spend the 4th of July with Mrs. Muir's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Barbur.

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. McKean, their daughter Miss Martha and son Bill, left Saturday for Camp Sherman to spend the 4th of July.

At the election last Tuesday, there were only 50 votes cast. Shows little interest in the three million dollar tax questions to be voted on.

Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Feldman, Miss Opal and Miss Norma, left Saturday evening for Hanson's camp on the Metolious river to be gone over the 4th of July.

Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Everett left Friday evening on their annual vacation, this time a trip to Bend and vicinity and the lakes adjacent. They expected to be absent six or seven days.

The new dry goods store, to be operated by Casteel & Stanley, opened Saturday with a nice line of goods. Mr. Casteel formerly lived at Wasco and recently returned here from Pilot Rock, where he has been operating a similar store.

Wasco was visited again by burglars last Wednesday night. The postoffice safe was blown open and about \$600 in stamps, a government army revolver and about \$22 in money was taken. The Standard Oil Co. also lost two tires and about five gallons of gasoline. J. P. Yates, owner of the lumber yard, also experienced a loss of about \$10. So far no clues have been traced. A finger print expert was called from The Dalles, but found no prints, the thieves had worn gloves.

### New Store at Wasco

A new dry goods and men's furnishing goods store was opened at Wasco last Saturday, July 2, by Casteel & Stanley in the concrete building next door to the Wasco postoffice.

A number of local people, who have visited the new store since its opening day, report that the stock is a complete fresh line of merchandise that is a pleasure to shoppers to have the opportunity from which to make their selections.

The new store will handle a complete line of dry goods, including notions, as well as a standard line of men's furnishings and shoes for everyone, including ladies, misses, children and men.

R. L. Casteel is well known to a majority of Sherman county people through his former connection with the Geo. N. Crofield store at Wasco. Mr. Casteel's brother, E. B. Casteel, and W. C. Stanley are associated in the operation of the new enterprise. The three are moving to Sherman county from Pilot Rock, Oregon, where they have a similar store which they intend to sell and all three unite in helping build up and sustain a little better and more prosperous Sherman county.

### Wasco Paper has New Owner

As the result of an attachment proceeding brought by two wholesale paper firms of Portland two weeks ago, for non-payment of bills, and the consequent action by Earl Jones of Wasco in the foreclosure of a mortgage to protect his interests, the Wasco News-Enterprise was sold at sheriff sale on Tuesday to Mr. Jones for the amount of his mortgage and expenses incurred.

Mr. Jones, in all probability, will dispose of the property to Mr. Adsit, now publisher of a newspaper at Pilot Rock.

### Drives Car Off Highway

An accident that ended happily for all concerned occurred on the Sherman highway Tuesday morning, about two miles north of Moro, when Roy Belshee, living north of Wasco, drove off the side of the road at nearly the same place his father had wrecked his car some years ago. Mr. Belshee was coming to Moro on business and says that he must have dozed off for an instant with the result stated. The windshield and top of the car were badly wrecked by the car turning over twice before coming to a stop. It was placed on its wheels and came onto the highway, into Moro and back home without further attention other than straightening bent fenders.

### Accident Halts Oration

Instead of delivering the Fourth of July oration at Silverton, Judge R. R. Butler of The Dalles spent the day in St. Vincent's hospital with various minor injuries as a result of an automobile accident on the Base Line road. Judge Butler was en route to Portland with his brother, Chauncey Butler, in the car of Dr. W. M. Morse of the Mid-Columbia hospital. Dr. and Mrs. Morse occupied the front seat and the Butler brothers were in the back. As they moved at 20 miles an hour over the pavement, which was wet by a light shower, the car ahead stopped at the Troutdale railroad crossing, a stop which is rarely made by motor cars on that highway. The doctor applied his brakes and then came the skid. The machine slid to the side of the highway, fell into the ditch and toppled over. About everything on the car but the license plates was bent or broken. Dr. and Mrs. Morse escaped with slight injuries, and Chauncey Butler was struck on the shoulder and leg, but Judge Butler was roughly used, although no bones were broken. The judge was hustled off to the hospital in Portland. And this is why the most eloquent orator in the state senate of the Oregon legislature did not appear at Silverton to depict the glories of the 4th of July.

### Available to Every Home

Unprecedented strides have been made by the electric utilities of the United States in carrying electric service throughout the country, but the industry will not have achieved its purpose until electric service is made available to every American home.

The goal of the electrical industry is to make electric service available to the homes of the entire nation in city, town, hamlet, and on the farm. At present every city of 5,000 or more inhabitants; 97 per cent of all communities of more than 1,000; 40 per cent of all communities of more than 250; and 20 per cent of all hamlets of less than 250 have been reached.

Electric service is one item on the home-maker's budget which costs less than it did before the World War.

Every day more than ten tons of freight are moved a distance of one mile for every inhabitant of the United States in freight cars of the class 1 railroads. This amounted last year to carrying one ton of freight a distance of 3,791 miles for every man, woman and child of our population.
