Will Meet Sec'y Jardine

D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Experiment Farm, left here Wednesday for Pendleton where he met with W. A. Holt, county agent for Unadilla county and the two left the next day by auto for Caldwell, Idaho, where a large field meeting was to be held at the Idaho state station this Friday. One of the principal speakers at the meeting was to be W. M. Jardine, national secretary of agriculture and a former college classmate of Mr. Stephens, who is in Idaho on a 10-day vacation and fishing trip.

"The Sea Beast"

John Barrymore in "The Sea Beast" comes to the Wasco Theatre on Saturday. The picture, adapted from Herman Melville's "Moby Dick" and produced by Warner Brothers under the direction of Millard Webb, has been acclaimed as the most important photoplay of the year. It deals with the New England whalers of 1840 who, in their clipper ships, carried the American flag over the seven seas. It is said to have done for this heroic chapter in American history what "The Covered Wagon" did for the Western pioneers and "The Iron Horse" did for the building of the railroads. Barrymore, who has not been seen in pictures since, as "Beau Brummel" he won his gold medal for the greatest acting of the 1924 season, is said to have contributed another masterpiece of acting to the screen in the role of Ahab Ceeley, the fighting sailor whose towering pride and mighty strength carried him through blistering passion and murderous adventure.

D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Experiment Farm, met with forty farmers of the Kent district last Thursday at the Patjens and Andrews farm west of Kent, at which place a grain nursery is being conducted this year by the Experiment Farm.

The newly installed electric equipment at the Farmers' Elevator & Supply Co. elevator at Hay Canyon was tested thoroughly by Dell Wright on Wednesday and reported to the Moro office of the company as being in jandy shape for the run this season.

Anson Woods came into Moro on Sunday by train from his home at Walla Walla for a short visit with the old folks at home. He said that the recent cloud burst at Weston did not hit any of his farm property, but that it did slight damage to wheat growing on land owned by Mrs. Woods' sister.

George Tomlin arrived home in Moro by stage Wednesday afternoon. He has just completed a second enlistment term with the national machine corps, spending 27 months with the legion guard at Pekin, China. His first enlistment with the marine corps took him to France during the world war, where he saw service in the most notable battles participated in by the American forces.

City Marshal G. A. Williams has completed the work of attaching grass hose couplings to all city fire hydrants. This will make all fire apparatus comply with the state standard and permit any fire hose from other places to be used at Moro in an emergency such as the elevator fire last January when fire hose from Wasco and Grass Valley could not be coupled to the Moro city mains.

A number of local people who were in The Dalles on circus day last Tuesday have made favorable comment on the dinner and supper menu offered by the White restaurant, located in the new building part of a block east of Pease & Co. store. The menu had a choice of twenty different dinners, ten of which were served at 35 cents, and none over 50 cents, with soup and fixin's included.

A stage driver operating between Portland and The Dalles, last week was stung by a large bumble bee west of Hood River, causing almost instant blindness. He held the stage until relieved and was taken to a hospital at The Dalles when the stage reached that place. A stinger three-quarters of an inch long was removed from close to the pupil. Since then pus has formed in the eye, causing a small ulcer.

D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Experiment Farm, returned Tuesday from a visit of inspection to the grain nurseries conducted by the stations at Lexington, Heppner, and Pendleton. Grain nursery meetings with farmers of the sections visited were held at the three places; at Heppner on Saturday, at Lexington on Sunday, and at Pendleton on Monday. Mr. Stephens reports that crop prospects and the grain fields are the best he has seen in that section for a long time.

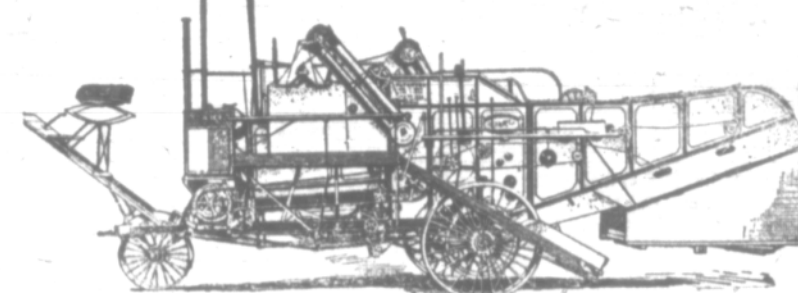
