Wheat Truck Upsets

Julian Quincy Gwynne, aged 30
years, farmer living 12 miles east of
Wasco, was fatally injured and F.
J. Bradley of Klickitat seriously in-
jured as the result of a wheat truck,
which Mr. Gwynne was driving,
turning over about three miles east
of Klondike last Friday afternoon
when meeting an automobile driven
by Mrs. F. M. Scott on the recently
constructed and gravelled market
road east of Klondike.

Both the loaded wheat truck and
the automobile when passing, gave
each other plenty of room, but the
right front wheel of the truck struck
a soft spot at the side of the gravel,
causing it to topple over. Bradley,
who was a helper worker with the
truck, was thrown clear of the wreck,
going out of the front seat through
the cab. Gwynne was pinned under
the wreck. At first he was not seri-
ously injured and called out to his
helper, asking if he were hurt. Short-
ly after, the load and truck suddenly
settled down on him, causing a frac-
tured skull, crushed chest, and other
injuries which resulted in almost in-
stant death.

Rattlesnake Bite Fatal

H. B. Belache lost a fine 2-year
old filly last Sunday from the effects
of a rattlesnake bite on the center
of its nose. The dead horse was run-
ning in a field along with several
others and feeding from hay dumps
scattered in the field. When found,
the nose of the dead horse showed
plainly the marks of the fangs. The
snake bite caused both nostrils to
swell shut, smothering the animal.

This is the third horse that has
been bitten by rattlesnakes on the
Belache farm this year. A saddle
horse was the first victim, the snake
marking it on the side of one nostril
which also swelled shut, but it was
able to breathe through the uninjured
nostril. The third was a mare, bitten
on the center of its belly. Both of
these animals recovered, altho the
mare had a hard time working the
poison out of its system.

Tests Tree Growth

The development and quality of
a tree depend upon its ability to
turn the light which falls upon it
into growth and strength. Using
this principle as a basis, a series of
experiments to determine the effi-
ciency of various kinds of trees has
recently been completed by the
Rocky Mountain Forest Experiment
Station in Colorado.

For nine months groups of ever-
green seedlings were grown under
the light of tungsten-flament blue-
glass electric lamps for ten hours
a day. It was found that some
species were five times more effi-
cient than others in turning this
light into growth.

The experiments will, it is said,
make it possible to plant only those
trees of known efficiency, and so
improve timber growth and the
future supply of lumber.

East Lake Short Cut Open

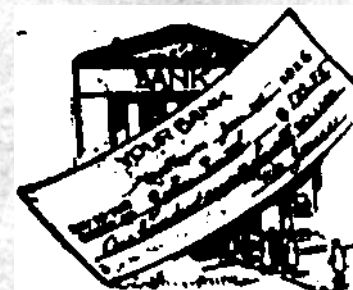
According to the Madras Pioneer,
the East lake short cut is now open
to traffic, and reported to be in good
condition. This short cut, known to
forest service officials as the North
Paulina road, skirts the north slope
of the Paulina mountains, connect-
ing the California highway at Lava
Butte with the China Hat-East lake
road, on the southeast slope of the
Paulinas.

The new road branches from the
California highway a few hundred
yards north of Lava Butte. The
branch is marked by Brooks-Scanlon
lumber camp directive signs. The
North Paulina road, constructed by
the forest service, swings through
the scenic cinder cone country south-
east of Bend.

Motorists report that the new road
has an easy grade. It reduces the
distance to East lake by some 10
miles, by either the Paulina Prairie
or China Hat route.
