Electric Co. Reduces Rates

Sherman Electric Announces Lower Charges for Light Heat and Power

This week the Sherman County Observer prints in full the new reduced rates put in force this month by the Sherman Electric Company on all its lines in Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow counties.

The new rates are very much lower than those formerly in force in this territory. This will be particularly noticeable in the reduced minimum charge which in most cases has been reduced half for all lighting service. A second noticeable reduction is the power rate, which was formerly based on a charge for horsepower installed and then an additional charge for all current used.

Residential Service

This schedule is applicable only to electric service furnished through one meter for lighting, cooking and small single phase power and heating equipment in private residence, independent flats, and individual apartments. It is not applicable to clubs, rooming houses, hotels or to apartment houses served under one contract. Rates per meter per month:

First 15 kilowatt, 15c per kwh.
 Next 15 kilowatt, 10c per kwh.
 Excess over 30 kilowatt, 3c per kwh.

Minimum monthly charge: \$1.50 per meter per month within the corporate limits of cities and towns, \$2.50 per meter per month in all other territory. Discount, none.

Water Heating Service

Any customer using an electric tank water heater in conjunction with an electric range, or other heavy duty cooking appliance having a capacity of two kilowatts or more, will be furnished service for such water heater at flat rates quoted below, providing the water heater and the cooking equipment are served through one service and so connected by means of a double throw switch or limiting device that it is impossible for a load greater than the normal cooking load to be thrown on the service at any one time.

No water heating service will be furnished unless tanks are equipped with an approved insulating cover and with a thermostatic device for limiting the water temperature to a practical maximum. Flat rates for water heaters:

600 Watt Heater, \$2.50 per month
 750 Watt Heater, \$2.75 per month
 1000 Watt Heater or larger, \$3.25 per month per kwh.

Commercial Service

This schedule applies to commercial, professional, mercantile, industrial, fraternal, educational, and other similar institutions for the service of lighting equipment and small incidental single phase appliances and power devices. Rates per meter per month:

First-30 kilowatt hours 15c per kwh.
 Next 30 kilowatt hours 10c per kwh.
 Next 140 kilowatt hours 8c per kwh.
 Next 400 kilowatt hours 6c per kwh.
 Next 400 kilowatt hours 5c per kwh.
 Next 1000 kilowatt hours 4c per kwh.
 Excess over 2000 kilowatt hours 3c per kwh.

Minimum monthly charge: \$1.50 per meter per month within the corporate limits of cities and towns, \$2.50 per meter per month in all other territory. Discount, none. Term of contract, one year.

Commercial Cooking

This schedule applies to service furnished for the operation of cooking and baking equipment in commercial installations such as restaurants, hotels, bakeries, hospitals, schools, etc. The service is unlimited except that where the installation includes heavy duty equipment for baking purposes the company may specify a daily peak load period of four hours during which such equipment shall not be operated by the customer. Rates per hour used per month:

First 100 kilowatt hours 4c per kwh.
 Next 200 kilowatt hours 3c per kwh.
 Next 700 kilowatt hours 2c per kwh.
 Excess over 1000 kilowatt hours per month 1 1/2 c per kwh.

Minimum charge: \$1.50 per month per kilowatt of maximum demand. The maximum demand is considered to be the maximum load that may be connected at any one time during normal operations and shall be taken as the manufacturers name plate rating, or at the company's option may be determined by suitable test or inspection. Discount, none. Term of contract not less than one year.

General Power Heater Rates

This schedule applies to service for electric motors, arc lamps for photographic processes, x-ray machines, and other power and heating devices not specifically included under other schedules in this tariff and is not applicable to power service furnished for operating generators used for supplying energy directly to lighting circuits. Net rate:

First 35 kilowatt hours used per month per horsepower of maximum demand, 7c per kwh.
 Next 65 kilowatt hours used per month per horsepower of maximum demand, 2c per kwh.
 Excess monthly consumption over above, 1c per kwh.
 Minimum monthly charge \$1.50 per horsepower of maximum demand.
 Quantity discounts, applying to monthly bills under this schedule: First \$100 of monthly bill, no dis-

count; next \$100 of monthly bill, 10% discount; next \$100 of monthly bill, 20% discount; next \$100 of monthly bill, 30% discount; excess over first \$400 of monthly bill, 40% discount.

On installations totaling 20 horsepower or less, the connected load expressed in manufacturer's rated horsepower capacity of equipment, will be assumed to be the maximum demand, except that for installations totaling more than 5 horsepower the maximum demand may be determined by suitable test of service where conditions, other than over-motoring warrant. The maximum demand shall be determined by suitable test in any case where it appears that the installation is being operated normally under a load greater than the name plate rating of the equipment.

On installations totaling more than 20 horsepower the maximum demand shall be taken as the highest average demand recorded during any period of 15 consecutive minutes and shall be determined by suitable test.

For the purpose of this schedule no maximum demand will be considered as being less than 1 horsepower or less than two-thirds of the manufacturer's rated capacity of the equipment.

When x-ray machines are served under this schedule the maximum demand used for computing charges for service to such machines will be considered as 40% of the instantaneous capacity of such equipment, except that no such installation will be considered as having a demand less than 1 horsepower.

Seasonal and Temporary Service

Service will be given under this schedule for apparatus in connection with an established enterprise of a permanent but strictly seasonal character, but in such cases the customer shall pay the regular rates for a period of not less than six months in each year.

Service will be given under this schedule for apparatus installed in connection with an enterprise of strictly temporary character on a month to month basis, provided the customer furnishes all necessary material and equipment incident to giving him service and pay all erection, dismantling, connection and disconnection costs, including a reasonable amount for depreciation on material and equipment furnished by the company.

Irrigation Service

Customers operating irrigation pump motors under the six months seasonal provision of this schedule will be permitted to use such motors during the remainder of the year in pumping water for domestic and stock consumption and for other purely domestic purposes, provided the operation of such motors is confined to an off-peak period to be specified by the company. Monthly charges for service during such period shall be computed according to the regular schedule except that the minimum monthly charge shall be 25c per horsepower and not less than \$1.50.

Term of contract, not less than one year for regular service.

Women Want Service

Daily Household Tasks Made Easier With Electricity

More than seven women out of ten on American farms believe that electric service is the greatest contributing factor in making daily household tasks easier.

A questionnaire recently sent to a large group of women on farms, asking them what they most wanted to make their work easier, brought 882 replies. Of this total, 889 said that electricity would be the most desirable addition.

The electric equipment wanted appears as follows, in the order of preference shown in the replies:

1. Electric lighting.
2. Iron.
3. Washing machine.
4. Water pumping system.
5. Vacuum cleaner.
6. Toaster, percolator, fans, etc.
7. Electric sewing machine.
8. Electric range.
9. Electric refrigerator.
10. Electric water heater.

Safety Hints

Although poisons are known to be terribly dangerous, every well-equipped home has a medicine chest containing a variety of poisons ranging from iodine up, which usually are not kept locked. These bottles should be kept in a separate chest or each identified with a pin for the sake of those whose common sense or observation is stultified.
