The annual conference of the

Celebrity Visits County

Upon the invitation and initiative
of Manager E. E. Larimore of Hotel
Moro, Sherman county and more
particularly Moro was honored by a
visit on Wednesday and Thursday of
this week by Hon. Milton A. Miller,
known widely over the state of Ore-
gon as "the sage of Lebanon."

Mr. Miller is a deep student of
current events in their relation to
historical affairs of the past and their
bearing upon present events. The
study of events relating to the history
of the United States has resulted in
Mr. Miller having prepared some
time since a lecture entitled "The
Building of a Nation."

It was for the purpose of having
Mr. Miller deliver this lecture to the
school children of Moro, Wasco and
Grass Valley that Mr. Larimore when
in Portland recently, requested that
Mr. Miller visit Sherman county for
his purpose. While in the county
the lecture was also given at a public
meeting held Wednesday evening at
the local American Legion hall and
at a meeting of the Harland View
grange held at their hall in Hay
Canyon on Thursday evening.

Mr. Miller was state senator from
Linn county for a number of suc-
cessive terms of office and was also
collector of customs for the Oregon
district, having been appointed to the
office by President Woodrow Wilson.

Leases Dalles Auditorium

When in Moro on Tuesday from
Wasco Newton Crossfield made the
announcement that he had taken over
a lease of the civic auditorium at The
Dalles in part partnership with the
West Coast vaudeville division of one
of the largest film producing compa-
nies in the United States.

The West Coast division owns and
controls more than 400 theatres on
the Pacific coast, their interests cov-
ering the best theatre properties from
Los Angeles on the south to British
Columbia on the north.

The auditorium will open under
Mr. Crossfield's management on
Thursday, November 3, with a high
class vaudeville show at a popular
price of 50 cents for any seat in the
house. This will be followed by other
high grade attractions, coming to The
Dalles from off the Panfages circuit
and the Fanchon-Marc circuit. These
are rated as the most exclusively high
grade circuits on the coast.

In addition to the vaudeville at-
tractions Mr. Crossfield will present
the best of the up-to-date pictures
as they are released by the big
feature film companies. It is planned
to present these pictures on Satur-
day, Sunday and Monday nights of
each week.

McNary Plans for Farm Aid

United States Senator McNary left
Oregon October 24th, for Washing-
ton and the next congressional ses-
sion, stopping enroute at St. Paul and
Chicago to thresh out farm legislation
possibilities with farm organizations
at those cities.

"I am leaving Oregon for the east,"
aid Senator McNary, "earlier than
had hoped because of uncertainty
as to the farm legislation is to
take. I propose to hold a series of
conferences in Washington with farm
leaders, representatives of farm or-
ganizations, business men and ad-
visors of the administration. My
hope is that some measure that will
be safe and satisfactory to the busi-
ness and farm interests of the coun-
try will be adopted into law."

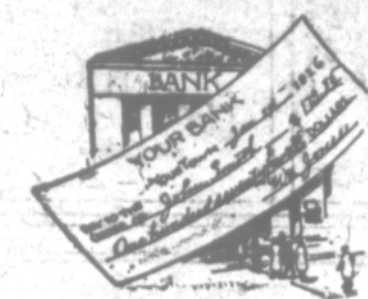
