

ORDINANCE NO. 107

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and directing the execution and delivery in the name and on behalf of the City of Moro, of a contract with the Sherman Electric Co., a corporation, providing for the furnishing by said Sherman Electric Co. to the City of Moro of electric lighting service upon the streets, highways and public places within the corporate limits of the City of Moro, for a period of ten years from and after the first day of March, 1928; a copy of the contract so authorized being set forth in this ordinance.

THE CITY OF MORO DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the City of Moro make and enter into a contract with Sherman Electric Co., a corporation, providing for the furnishing by said Sherman Electric Co. to the City of Moro of electric lighting service for lighting the streets, highways and public places within the corporate limits of the City of Moro, for the period of ten (10) years from and after the 1st day of March, 1928, which contract shall be signed by the Mayor, sealed with the corporate seal and attested by the Recorder of the City of Moro, and shall be in word and figures as follows:

THIS AGREEMENT made this day of March, 1928, between the City of Moro, hereinafter called the City, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon, party of the first part, and Sherman Electric Co., a corporation, hereinafter called the Company, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH: That whereas the execution and delivery of this contract has been duly authorized by ordinance No. 107 of the City of Moro, passed by the city council thereof at a regular meeting held on the day of March, 1928, and approved by the Mayor on the day of March, 1928:

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO DO MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Company agrees to furnish to the City of Moro for the term of ten (10) years from and after the 1st day of March, 1928, and the City of Moro agrees to take from the Company and to pay for under the terms thereof, all electric lighting service which may now or hereafter be required by said City for lighting the streets and highways thereof during said term.

Section 2. Until increased or modified as hereinafter provided the lighting service to be furnished hereunder shall consist in the installation, operation and maintenance by the Company of five (5) 400 nominal rated candlepower incandescent electric lamps, twelve (12) 250 nominal rated candlepower incandescent electric lamps, and thirty (30) 100 nominal rated candlepower incandescent electric lamps, one of such lamps to be fastened to or suspended from suitable bracket fixtures attached to the Company's electric lines at each of the following designated street intersections or locations in said City, to-wit:

One such 400 candlepower lamp at each of the following locations, to-wit:

Corner Main and 4th Streets.
Corner Main and 2nd Streets.
Corner Main and 1st Streets.
Corner 1st and Scott Streets.
Corner 1st and Pump Streets.

One such 250 candlepower lamp at each of the following locations, to-wit:

On Main between 4th and 1st Streets.
On Main between 1st and 2nd Streets.
On Main between 2nd and 3rd Streets.

Corner of Main and 3rd Streets.
On Main between 3rd and Hansen Streets.

Corner of Main and Hansen Streets.
On Main between Hansen and Bidwell Streets.

Corner of Main and Bidwell Streets.
On 1st between Track and Pump Streets.

On 1st between Pump and Main Streets.
On 1st between Main and Scott Streets.

On 1st at Railroad Tracks.
One such 100 candlepower lamp at each of the following locations, to-wit:

City View Addition and Railroad Ave.
Hayes Addition and Railroad Ave.

Second and Railroad Tracks.
Sixth and Scott Streets.

Weaver and Lincoln Streets.
Bidwell between Main and Scott Streets.

Third and McCoy Streets.
On 1st at U. S. Experimental Farm.

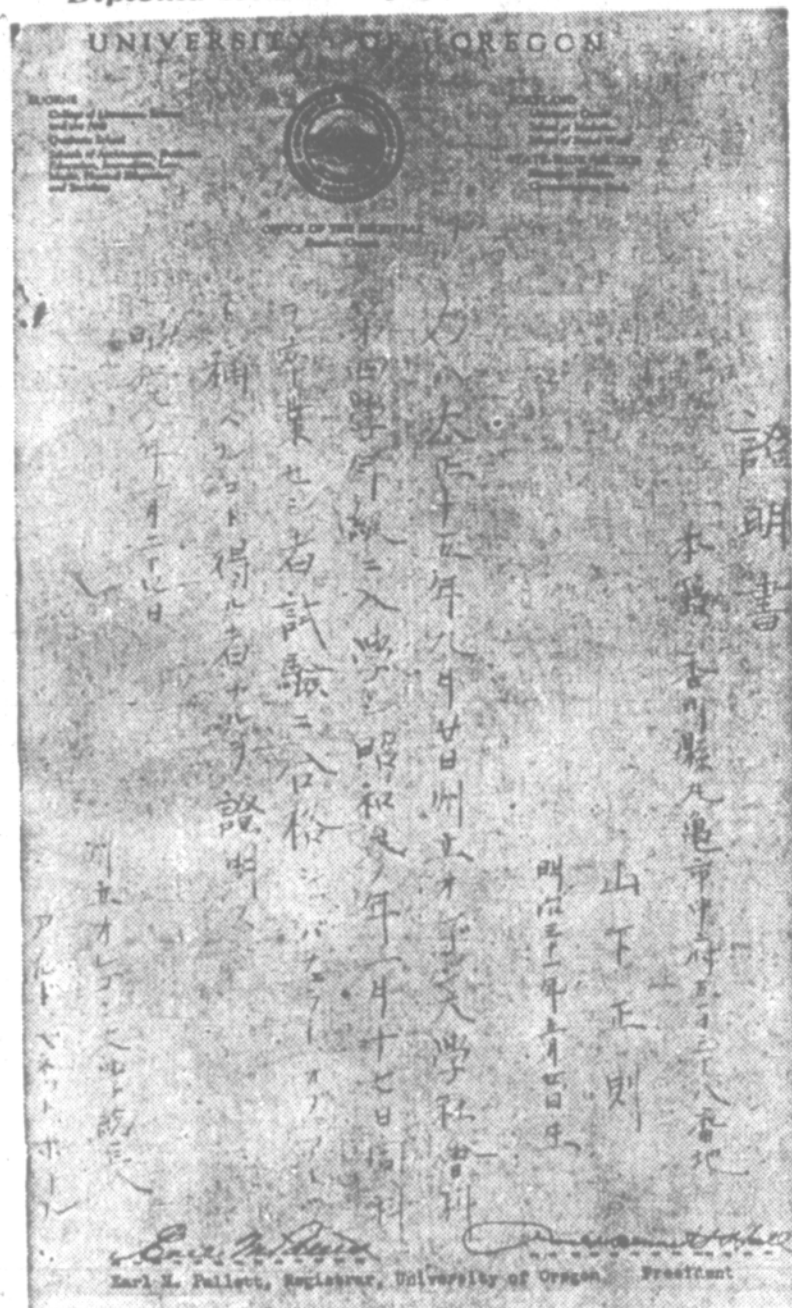

Said lamps upon being installed as above provided shall thereafter be maintained and operated at such locations, respectively, during the full term of this agreement; provided, however, that the Company will at any time upon request of the City remove any lamps installed hereunder to a new location or locations upon the Company's overhead distributing system within said City, without expense to the City, if such change of location requires only the transfer of the same equipment to an existing pole line carrying a street lighting circuit, and does not require the installation of any additional materials or the construction of any additional distributing lines or street lighting circuits.

Section 3. The Company will at all times hereunder, except when prevented by accident or other causes beyond its control, supply the necessary electric energy for current for operating from nightfall to daylight of each day all lamps installed hereunder, and will from time to time promptly install, at its own expense, new lamps in replacement of burned out lamps.

The Company further undertakes and agrees to cause each lamp installed hereunder to be turned on at nightfall and to be turned off at daylight on each and every day.

The City shall not be required to pay to the Company for the operation of any lamp hereunder for any night or nights during which the Company shall have failed to supply the electric energy or current for

operating such lamp, and a ratable reduction shall be made in the monthly bill on account of any such failure or failures of electric service; failure or failures of electric service, also in the event of a failure of the company to supply the necessary lamps for renewals from time to time, as needed, a like ratable reduction shall be allowed upon the monthly bill for the night or nights such lamp or lamps shall have been out of service.

The Company shall not be liable for or on account of any failure of service hereunder beyond or other than such ratable reductions in the monthly bill under the conditions above specified.

Section 4. The Company will from time to time, upon receipt of written request from the City Council of the City, or within a reasonable time thereafter, install at the location or locations specified in such request, and upon suitable bracket or suspended fixtures upon the Company's poles, such additional incandescent lamps of standard size or sizes and types as may be requested, provided that the lamps of the sizes and types so requested are such as may be conveniently operated on the same street lighting system or circuit as the lamps specified in Section 2 hereof.

All additional lamps that may be so installed shall be maintained and operated in the manner and subject to the conditions specified in Section 3 hereof, and shall be paid for by the City as hereinafter provided during the full remainder of the term of this agreement.

Such installation shall be at the cost of the Company, except where the Company shall be required to erect additional poles or pole lines to operate such new lamps or to install such lamps at a location necessitating the stringing of wires for such purpose a greater distance than three hundred (300) feet for each lamp to be installed, upon the then established pole lines of the Company; where wires must be strung a greater distance than three hundred (300) feet along a pole line then in use and operated by the Company, or where additional poles must be erected to serve such additional lamps, the City will pay to the Company, in addition to its regular monthly payment hereunder for the monthly payment hereunder for the Company of stringing such street lighting wires and circuits, over and above the cost of stringing such wires upon an existing pole line for the distance above mentioned.

Company, however, shall not be required to install any such additional lamp or lamps within a period of six (6) months next preceding the expiration of the term hereof.

Section 5. For the lighting service described in Section 2 hereof, the City of Moro will pay to the Company the following rates and charges, to-wit:

\$3.92 per month for each of said 400 nominal rated candlepower lamps;

\$2.67 per month for each of said 250 nominal rated candlepower lamps;

\$1.00 per month for each of said 100 nominal rated candlepower lamps;

and for all additional lights or lamps that may hereafter be installed and operated by the Company at the request of said City, said City will pay to the Company the latter's regular tariff charges then in effect for lamps of such sizes and types under a ten (10) year contract, one-twelfth of the yearly charge specified in the tariff for any such lamp or lamps being payable monthly. Payments for all service rendered shall be made by said City to the Company on or before the 10th day of each month for the service furnished during the preceding calendar month.

Section 6. Should the Company at any time during the term hereof become unable to secure as required any lamp or lamps of the type then in service hereunder, by reason of the manufacturers discontinuing the making of such type of lamp, or other good cause, the Company at the request of said City, said City will pay to the Company the latter's regular tariff charges then in effect for lamps of such sizes and types under a ten (10) year contract, one-twelfth of the yearly charge specified in the tariff for any such lamp or lamps being payable monthly. Payments for all service rendered shall be made by said City to the Company on or before the 10th day of each month for the service furnished during the preceding calendar month.

Section 7. It is understood and agreed that the service herein provided for and the rates of payment applicable thereto are based upon service under a ten (10) year contract and by means of the overhead electric distributing pole lines of the Company; and that said rates and provisions hereof shall be at all times subject to any lawful orders or regulations which may be made by the Public Service Commission of the State of Oregon.

Section 8. This agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the respective parties hereto.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, to this agreement in duplicate, the City of Moro, has caused its corporate name to be signed by its Mayor, said City's corporate seal to be affixed, attested by its Recorder, and Sherman Electric Co. has caused its corporate name to be signed by its Vice-President and its corporate seal to be affixed, attested by its Assistant Secretary, as of the day and year above written.

Section 2. It is hereby determined by the City Council of said City of Moro that the amount of lighting service, as specified in the contract hereby authorized, is necessary to enable said City to provide proper protection for itself and the inhabitants thereof, and is essential to the safety and welfare of said City and its inhabitants.

Section 3. The Mayor of the City of Moro is hereby authorized and directed to make, execute and deliver such contract with Sherman Electric Co. in the name and behalf of the City of Moro, and the Recorder shall affix the seal of said City to said contract, and shall attest the same, upon execution thereof by the Mayor as herein provided.

Section 4. One publication of this ordinance in the Sherman County Observer is hereby directed.

Oregon Early Day Papers

McMinnville News-Reporter First Weekly Newspaper in State Now Running

The McMinnville News-Reporter bears the distinction of being the oldest weekly newspaper published in the state of Oregon, a distinction of which Editor Meresse should be, and no doubt is, quite proud. Any newspaper which has survived the ravages of time and the changing conditions of nearly sixty years must be pretty well founded and incidentally Editor Meresse has given the people of Yamhill county seat city a mighty good newspaper.

In checking over the list of some 200 papers published in Oregon, it is remarkable to note that there are so many weekly newspapers which have survived over a period of many years. The Graphic, which was founded in 1888 by Messrs. Hyatt and Hobson, is classed with four other newspapers of weekly publication in this state in point of longevity. There are eight-

teen weekly newspapers in Oregon which have been published for a longer period than has the Graphic. These are in order of length of years, as follows: McMinnville News-Reporter 1871, Hillsboro Independent 1873, Weston Leader 1878, Athena Press 1879, Curry County Reporter of Gold Beach 1879, Lake County Examiner of Lakeview 1880, Silverton Appeal 1880, Independence Enterprise 1881, St. Helens Mist 1881, Arlington Bulletin 1883, Heppner Gazette-Times 1883, Eastern Oregon Republican of Union 1883, Enterprise Record-Chief-land 1884, Blue Mountain Eagle of Canyon City 1886, Washington County News-Times of Forest Grove 1886, Fossil Journal 1886, Burns Times-Herald 1887, and Milton Eagle 1887.

The four other weekly newspapers which like the Graphic were founded in 1888 were Polk County Itemizer-Observer of Dallas, Pacific Record-Herald of Medford, Sherman County Observer of Moro, and Tillamook Headlight.

Among the daily papers of the state the Oregonian is the oldest, having been founded in 1850, but the Salem Statesman is a close second, dating its origin to the year 1851.

Other daily papers in order of the dates of their first publication follow: Eugene Guard 1859, Corvallis Gazette-Times 1862, Oregon City Enterprise 1866, Baker Morning Democrat 1870, Medford Mail Tribune 1871, Pendleton East Oregonian 1875, and Portland Telegram 1888. The Portland Journal was not founded until 1902.

The editor of the Sherman County Observer, C. L. Ireland, set his first type and started to learn the printers trade in the office of the McMinnville Reporter in 1884, when the paper was then owned by his father. At that time the files of the Reporter office will show that it then printed a daily paper in McMinnville and the now editor of the Sherman County Observer was the boy who delivered the paper each evening to the subscribers of the daily Reporter.

The above list of early day daily newspapers of Oregon yet being published in this state should also contain the name of the Daily Astorian, published first at Astoria in 1871 and which was started by D. C. Ireland, father of C. L. Ireland, who also first started the Enterprise at Oregon City.
