Fertilize Lawns In March

A beautiful green lawn sets off a home as nothing else will, but in order to have a good lawn it is sometimes necessary to add fertilizer to the soil to insure a better grass growth, says Dr. R. E. Stephenson, associate professor of soils at the state college. "March is the ideal time to fertilize the lawn," said Dr. Stephenson, "and ammonium sulphate is the best fertilizer to use, because it produces an acid condition in the soil, which is favorable to the growth of lawn grasses but retards the growth of weeds. "Much experimental work has been done with different nitrogen carrying lawn fertilizers. The application of ammonium sulphate at the rate of about half a pound to 100 square feet of soil has given best results. After the material has been dusted on the lawn, it is advisable to wash the blades of grass free from chemical to prevent burning," he concluded.

Land plaster is used to advantage to dust potato seed just before planting. It stops the bleeding and may stimulate the young potato plant by bringing other elements of plant food into solution more readily.

Home Pointers

(School of Home Economic, O.S.C.)

Left over roast meat, finely ground and mixed with a little horse radish or chopped pickles and mayonnaise, makes a good sandwich filling.

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Butter icing for cup cakes or cookies is made by creaming one-half cup of butter and adding gradually, sifted confectioners' sugar. Add 2 or 3 tablespoonsful of strong coffee and one-half teaspoon of vanilla for flavor a few drops at a time when creaming.

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If raisins are placed in a warm oven for a few minutes to make them plump and dredged with flour before adding into cake or cookie batter, they will be less likely to sink.

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To vary eggs as a sandwich filling, add deviled ham and a little cream to chopped hard-boiled eggs.

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Macaroni is usually broken into pieces an inch in length and cooked without blanching—in rapidly boiling water. When tender drain and rinse in cold water, then drain again. The cold water washes away the pastry exterior that would otherwise cause the pieces to stick together. Rice is best cooked in like manner.

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If milk is kept in a large shallow basin instead of a deep one, it will remain sweet much longer.

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The delicate flavor will be brought out in salt fish if it is soaked in sour milk before cooking.

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When gravy does not brown pour into it a tablespoonful of liquid coffee. It will brown immediately and contain no taste of coffee. This is quicker than browning flour when in a hurry.
