Election Day Past History

Several Candidates Have Chartered Boats For Trip Up Salt River

In the early days of United States history it was said of a candidate who had failed to receive the necessary votes to elect him to office that he "had gone on a trip up Salt River." Just why this legendary river came to be so designated is lost in ancient election lore, but it is thought to have been caused partly by the fears, tears and remorse of those who contributed to the periodic exodus, thus rudely made aware of the fact that their political fortunes were held to be in eclipse and consequently these ones were sure to see the affairs of the day through the haze of colored glass.

The primary election held last Friday in Sherman county was about as others have been in the past. Numerous political hopes were dashed to the ground by votes cast at the polls in much the same manner as will similar ambitions be lost to their owners at future election days.

Successful candidates nominated for office in Sherman county were: R. J. Carsner, republican, to be opposed by M. E. Weatherford, democrat, for state senator. E. W. Snell and J. P. Yates, state representatives, and G. G. Updegraff, district attorney, were nominated on the republican ticket with no opposing candidates on the democratic side.

Hugh Chrisman was nominated for sheriff by the republicans and will be opposed by T. M. Garrett, nominated by the democrats.

A. M. Wright was nominated for coroner by the republicans. As matters stand he will be opposed by Dr. C. L. Foley, present coroner and also a republican, who received the democratic nomination for this office by eight "write-in" votes.

Margaret Peetz, nominated for assessor by the republicans, has also an equal chance to be the nominee of the democrats. Robt. Urquhart was a "write-in" candidate for the democratic nomination for assessor and was tied with Mrs. Peetz, both receiving 16 votes for the democratic nomination. These two will have to draw straws to determine the final candidate of the democrats.

L. W. Rakes, county school superintendent, L. L. Peetz, county commissioner, G. C. Akers, county clerk, H. S. Wall, county surveyor, and A. M. Young, county treasurer, the last named a democrat, were each nominated by both parties as candidates to succeed themselves in office.

The republican vote in Sherman county for congressmen was: Butler, 204; Rittner, 19; Notson, 38; Palmer, 37; Bean, 2; Stanfield, 1; Boyd, 2; Pierce, 1. The democratic vote was for Pierce, 82; Butler, 7 and Palmer, 4.

Candidates for congress, nominated by the district at large, are Butler on the republican ticket and Pierce on the democratic ticket. An interesting phase of this contest is that Pierce received 317 republican votes in the primary.

Both parties made the same nominations for justice of the peace and constable for the several districts in Sherman county, with an exception at Wasco where F. Crews and Chas. Everett tie for constable on the democratic ticket. Nominees were A. E. Florer for justice and Jas. Coats for constable for Rufus; R. J. Ginn for justice and G. A. Williams for constable for Moro; J. A. Smith for justice and Chas. Everett for constable for Wasco; R. A. Stowe for justice and T. M. Garrett for constable for Grass Valley.

Democrats voted in only three precincts for central committeemen. Naming R. C. Atwood for Wasco, O. G. Sayre for Erskine, and a tie vote between J. C. Freeman and W. P. Jackson at Moro.

Republicans gave a tie vote for central committeemen in two precincts, Rufus between W. N. Jones and Curtis Tom and at Grass Valley between Fred Krurow and J. W. Hayes. Klondike failed to elect. Locust Grove elected Fred Hennagin; Monkland, P. C. Axtell; Erskine, Roy Powell; Michigan, Karl Eaton; Rutledge, Carl Adams; Kent, Fred Haynes; Moro, W. H. Ragsdale; Wasco, E. D. McKee.

The Legion Memorial ritual service will be used. The choir has prepared several pieces of music appropriate to the day.

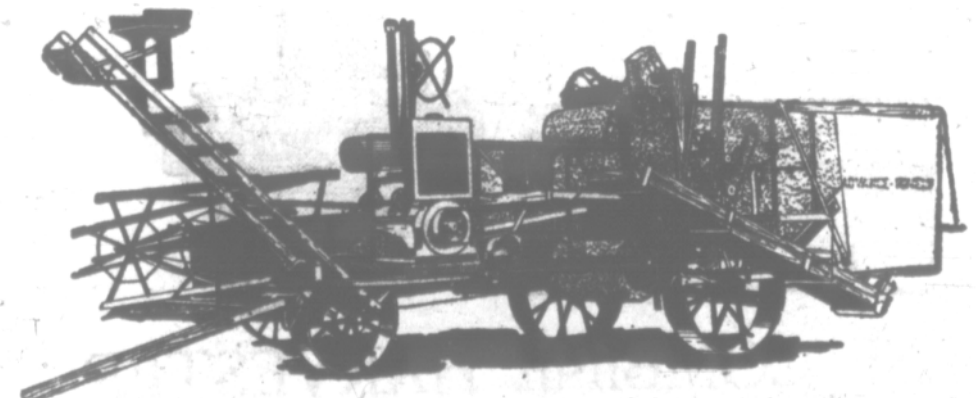
The commander of the Legion will preside and the Chaplain, Rev. Arthur Hicks, will deliver the Memorial address.
