May Term Circuit Court

The smallest amount of legal business ever transacted at a term of circuit court held in Sherman county was disposed of at the regular term of court held this week at Moro by Judge Parker.

All jurors called to attend the term were excused early Monday morning by phone when it was easily seen by court officials that no jury trials would be held at this term. A short session of the grand jury was held previous to excusing the jurors, but no business was transacted. Members of the grand jury in session were Hans Thompson, foreman, H. S. Conlee, A. G. Fetter, S. P. Boile, T. H. Fraser, T. S. Reese, C. R. Bruckert.

The only matter coming before the grand jury was that of Howard Steelman, held over to the grand jury on a charge of attempted robbery, on complaint of A. R. Bowen. Failure of Mr. Bowen to appear to prosecute caused dismissal of the case.

Attention Club Members

Summer School at Oregon State College Will Begin June 11th

The Club Members' summer school at Corvallis is set to begin on the 11th of June and close on the 23rd. It will be held on the campus of the Oregon State College.

Eligibility: All who have earned their trip by winning same at local or county fairs, and club members twelve years of age or over, with work up to date, elected as delegates, or who are paying their own expenses.

Girls should bring all necessary toilet articles, enough clothing for two weeks, including cotton dresses suitable for school wear, a party dress, heavy coat for cool days and evenings, and any of the following if they wish: Bloomers and shoes for gymnasium work, and a tennis racket if they play tennis. Bathing suits will be provided at the college. They should also bring all the bedding they will need, including blankets or sheets, comforts and pillows, if they use them. Beds and mattresses are furnished by the college.

Boys should bring all necessary toilet articles such as tooth brush, comb, towels, etc., a pair of overalls or coveralls for field or barn classes, regular clothes for other class work, and any or all of the following if they wish: Baseball glove, tennis racket and shoes. Swimming suits will be provided. They should also bring blankets or sheets, comforts and pillows, if they use them. Beds and mattresses will be furnished.

Money: Bring some extra money, as you may have a few incidentals that you wish to purchase, but do not bring more than a few dollars.

A bus will be arranged for and will leave Sherman county on Sunday June 10th. If a club member plans to go to the summer school he should write to the county superintendent at once and let him know so that arrangements will be made for transportation to and from the college. \$15 pays for board and room while there. This will cover all the necessary expenses.

IN MEMORIUM

MARGARET MC CALLUM

In the evening of a busy life at the age of more than 81 years death called to Mrs. Margaret McCallum early Monday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. F. Foss, in Moro on May 21. She was one of the early pioneer settlers of Sherman county and had lived to see the county grow from a wild waste of waving bunch grass to the successful and prosperous farming community it is at the present time.

Funeral services in her memory were held Wednesday afternoon under direction of Zell Funeral Home at the Moro Presbyterian church, Rev. Henry G. Hanson, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Woodburn and former pastor of Moro Presbyterian church, a close personal friend of the deceased, preached the sermon. Most beautiful were the floral tributes that had been offered by friends of Mrs. McCallum and the family which graced the auditorium of the church while the service was being held.

Mrs. Margaret McCallum was born December 25, 1846, in Cornwall, Ontario Canada, age 81 years 4 months 26 days, died at Moro, Oregon, May 21, 1928. She was married to Daniel McCallum October 3, 1871, at Cornwall. Three children were born to them. Mrs. Alice Holder and Mrs. Margaret Kuks, born at Cornwall, Canada, both of whom have passed on, and Mrs. Jennie Foss of Moro.

They left Canada and lived a few years in Wisconsin. Pioneering to Oregon in 1884, they settled on a farm near Moro. Her husband passed away November 23, 1890, since which time she has made her home with her daughter Mrs. Jennie Foss of Moro, who survives her. She is also mourned by three sisters, Mrs. Agnes McDonald of Spokane, Miss Jane McKay and Mrs. Annie Robinson both of Minneapolis, Minn. Also by seven grandchildren, four great grandchildren, eight nieces and six nephews.

Mrs. McCallum came into the Moro Presbyterian church by letter on November 10, 1888, having previously been a member of the Monkland Presbyterian church.

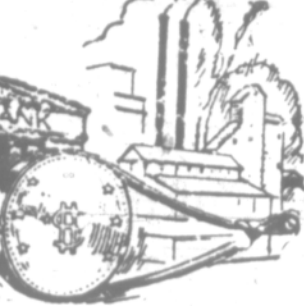
