How To Wear Out Your Tires.

If you want to increase the wear and tear on your tires, thereby increasing the tire dealers' profits, the following 10 methods will prove of assistance, remarks Moro Garage of Moro, Oregon.

- Come up to crossings at full speed, then slam on the brakes.
- Turn all corners on two wheels.
- Keep tires under-inflated.
- Always bump into the curb when parking.
- Get oil, grease and gasoline on your tires.
- Drive as fast as you can over rocky roads.
- Leave tires in the hot sun all day and forget to keep your spare painted with a protective tire dressing.
- Never repair a cut. Leave it open to let mud and water rot the cords and sand work blisters under the tread.
- Always drive exceedingly fast.
- And, last but not least, be sure your wheels are out of line. This includes tilt, wrong toe-in and mis-alignment of axles. Axles out of line cause the car to run dog fashion, that is, as though the differential was trying to get ahead of the radiator.
