### Gets Sunday Dinner Ready

Church attendance by those whose custom has been to serve the "Sunday Dinner" at approximately the noon hour has been increased through the use of electricity in the home.

Sunday dinner in most American homes is the most bountiful of the culinary week. Elaborate preparation, however, until the advent of the electric range, usually demanded that one or more members of the family remain at home.

Now ranges equipped with thermostatic control have solved this problem. With the aid of this device the Sunday dinner can be cooked while the entire family is attending church service. A prominent clergyman relates that his family for a long time has entrusted the range with the task of cooking dinner while his family is in church.

### U. of O. Psychologist Wins Fellowship Place

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—Thomas Cutsforth, head of experimental psychology laboratories at the University of Oregon, has been awarded a research fellowship with the Social Science Research Council, an organization regarded as the foremost scientific group in the United States. Cutsforth, who has become a national authority on synesthesia, and psychology of the blind,

Thomas Cutsforth will work on the project "psychopathic personality of the blind as a factor in economic maladjustment." Cutsforth himself is blind, but he has never considered this a handicap in any way, and has actually designed and helped to make much of the apparatus now in use at the university laboratory. Mr. Cutsforth will study with the council with the aim of advancing knowledge in the field of vocational education of the blind. He has already done considerable work on a comparative study of the learning of the blind, and in connection with this has done experimentation in finger maze and with other apparatus.

### Bad Roads Tax Is High

Motorists pay a bad roads tax equivalent to 22.3 cents on every gallon of gas consumed on a poor highway. The Oregon State Motor Association reports that this conclusion was drawn from experiments recently conducted in Washington, Iowa and North Carolina.

The figures were based on the premise of a car making 10 miles to the gallon on a rough highway. On a basis of a speed of 33 miles per hour, the test showed the cost of gasoline and tires per one thousand miles over rough roads used in the experiments was \$35.10 for an average four cylinder car weighing 3,500 pounds loaded. The cost for the same car at the same speed over a very smooth improved road was only \$12.80, according to the tests.
