### Heat Record Broken

Hottest Weather in Twenty Years, Reports Moro Station

Heat records at Moro Experiment Station went glimmering this week when the mercury of the government weather bureau thermometer rose each day since last Saturday to a new and higher mark than the day before.

Sunday, July 22nd, the register stood at 101 degrees; Monday it was 104; Tuesday 108, the hottest in twenty years, said Supt. D. E. Stephens, and on Wednesday it went to 110. A very slight cool breeze on Wednesday helped to temper the heat for some. A number of harvester crews laid off from work in the afternoon of Wednesday, especially horse power and self propelled outfits. Other outfits that were pulled by tractor power continued at work, the slight coolness caused by the movement of the machines being preferred by the crews to sitting around in the heat.

Thursday seems to be as hot—even hotter—than any other day of the week, but there is a slight chance that the instruments at the station may record a drop in the high temperature recorded thus far this week.

Wheat harvest is now on. The yield will not be what was hoped for, but there will be a lot of wheat and the quality is good.

That smile on the face of J. M. Wilson is caused by word from The Dalles that a son was born there on the 19th. Reports were that the mother and son were doing well.

While the word was not unexpected, all were shocked to hear of the death of Mrs. E. A. Hoskinson at Salem last Thursday. This end of the county was well represented at the funeral in Moro Sunday, as a none knew her but to love and respect her.

William Kohler was killed in an automobile wreck near here Saturday. He was returning to his home from the Kopke speech about two o'clock in the afternoon, and evidently lost control of his car going down a steep hill and at a short curve ran off the bridge across the canyon on the road west of the Louie Schadewitz farm. Telephone from Zell Tuesday stated that his relatives were in The Dalles and that the funeral would be held there Wednesday at 10 a. m.

Receipts of the state corporation department for the year ending June 30, 1928, were \$487,547.30 or approximately \$40,773 in excess of those for the previous 12 months. The expense of conducting the department during the past year was \$3000 in excess of that of the previous year.

#### Home Pointers

(School of Home Economic, O.S.C.)

Beef and pig liver may be cooked with a tomato sauce which takes away the strong flavor yet leaves all the value. The liver is first scalded then rolled in flour. Brown in fat and add a cup of strained, canned tomatoes. Cook slowly for 15-20 minutes.

The vitamin A content of hens' eggs may be increased by feeding the hens on fresh bluegrass range or by giving fresh lawn clippings.

Green peppers are one of the best sources of vitamin C. They have nearly four times as much as string beans.

Time may be saved by boiling potatoes with the peel on and putting them through the ricer. The peels will remain in the ricer and all the potato can be forced through.

Leaf lettuce is much richer in vitamin A than head lettuce. This is true in the case of all green versus bleached vegetables.

Beef kidney, liver, heart and brain all contain at least twice as much iron as round steak.

A meal may be planned around a bottle of milk instead of a pound of meat.

Tranchell & Parelus of Portland received the contract for the general construction of the new state tuberculosis hospital to be located at The Dalles on a bid of \$102,310. The board allowed Barham Bros., of Salem to withdraw their bid of \$94,000. The successful contractors have agreed to complete the structure in 150 days.

Nothing will be done by the state highway commission with relation to paving the Klamath Falls-Lakeview Junction section of The Dalles-California highway until after the electorate has passed on the so-called Dunne measure at the November election. This was the information given out by Roy Klein, state highway engineer.

#### "WE AMERICANS"

"We Americans," one of the great motion pictures of the year, will open at the Cozy theatre, Grass Valley, on Friday, August 3rd. It is an unusual picture in many ways. In the first place it brings George Sidney in a dramatic role. Sidney is too great an actor to stay always in the comedies which have brought him to so many screens.

He portrays his role in "We Americans" with rare discrimination; he never overacts, and proves himself capable of rare emotional depth, including honest tears.

But a little about the story: Three families emigrate to New York, from Russia, Germany and Italy. The parents retain all they loved of the old country, making no effort to become Americanized, while the children grow up to be typical young Americans, incapable of understanding their parents who, in turn, are incapable of understanding their children.

But the War comes along for a brief moment and their children enlist. To go further would spoil your enjoyment of this masterpiece, but you can see the possibilities. The ending is of rare beauty and happiness, raising the picture to the heights of art.
