NORTHWEST HIT BY FIRES

Temperatures High and Humidity Low, Favoring Spread of Flames.
Portland, Or.—High temperatures and low humidity, the combination of conditions feared by fire fighters everywhere, resulted in many serious blazes in the Pacific northwest.
Following is a list of a few of the more serious fires: Klickitat lumber mill loss put at \$50,000. Long-Bell holdings suffer serious blaze. Five blazes reported raging in Lane county. Farm home burns in Lewis county. Three fires are raging in Grays Harbor county. Two hundred acres of grain burn at Walla Walla.

Milton, Or.—One of the most disastrous fires in the history of the twin cities of Milton and Freewater, totaling a loss approximating \$300,000, destroyed the Western Dairymen building, the Milton-Freewater Fruit Growers Union warehouse, and one block of business establishments in North Milton at an early hour Sunday morning and for a time threatened the entire business and residential section of Freewater.

South Dakota Crops Ruined by Hail, Washington Springs, S. D.—Approximately 100 square miles of crops from north of Washington Springs, south-east through Lake, were destroyed when a 20-minute hail storm struck the section. The storm struck a district about four and a half miles wide and about 20 miles long.

New United States Bill Smaller.
Washington, D. C.—The new United States paper money which will go into circulation next July 1 will be smaller than the present bills. It will be signed by the secretary of the treasury instead of the registrar of the treasury.

Washington, D. C.—Oral arguments before the Interstate Commerce commission on the Great Northern Pacific railway merger were set for Oct. 2 and 4, in Washington.
