Hope to Extend View of Heavens' Wonders

Galileo's telescope, which suddenly expanded the known stellar universe at the beginning of the Seventeenth century, had a lens about two and a quarter inches in diameter, with an area eighty times that of the pupil of the eye. This increase in light collecting power was sufficient to reveal nearly 500,000 stars (over the entire heavens) as compared with the few thousands previously within range, writes George Ellery Hale in Harper's.

The 100-inch mirror of the Hooker telescope at Mount Wilson observatory, which collects about 100,000 times as much light as the eye, is capable of recording geographically more than a thousand million stars. While the gain since Galileo's time seems enormous, the possibilities go far beyond. Starlight is falling on every square mile of the earth's surface and the best we can do at present is to gather up and concentrate the rays that strike an area 100 inches in diameter.

A 200-inch telescope would give us four times as much light as we now receive with the 100-inch, while a 300-inch telescope would give nine times as much.

Valuable New Alloy

A metal alloy for moving picture screens which shows pictures clearly with half the usual electric current, has been invented and successfully applied in three workmen's clubs in Leningrad, according to motion picture authorities. A special shape in the screens is also said to increase the effect of perspective in the pictures, making figures seem to stand out in sharp relief against the backgrounds.

Emigration From Great Britain Down. London.—Coupled with the surprising fact that the figures for the last year show a net decrease of some 30,000 in the emigrants from Great Britain as compared with 1927 is another fact still more surprising, namely, that in neither year has the American quota for British immigrants been reached.

Flint, Mich., Mayor Arrested. Flint, Mich.—William McKeligan, mayor of Flint, was arrested here, charged with theft of election ballots and stuffing of ballot boxes in connection with the recent state primary election.

Nanking Regime Recognized by U. S. Washington, D. C.—Official recognition of the Nationalist regime in Nanking as the de jure government of China has been extended by the United States. There will be no formal announcement of this important action, officials said, unless Nanking asks that it be done.

R. F. Outcault, Noted Cartoonist, Dies. Flushing, N. Y.—Richard F. Outcault, cartoonist and creator of "The Yellow Kid," "Buster Brown," and other newspaper comics, died at his home here. He was 65 years old.

SEEK RIGHT NAMES OF PLACES IN U. S.

Compile Guide to Spelling and Pronunciation.

Washington.—An official guide to names of American places, hard to pronounce and harder to spell, will be provided when the United States Geographic board completes a new gazetteer.

Recognizing the need for determining, for example, whether the Minnesota Iron range should be spelled Mesabi or Mesaba, or Missabi, the board has been working through various sources to dispose finally and officially of such riddles.

More than half the states are co-operating by appointing a board to supply information. Frank Bond, chairman of the geographic board, now is correlating local prejudice and practice with what has become more or less official through decisions of the board.

The dispute in the state of Washington over the name of Mount Rainier, which residents of the town of Tacoma wished changed to honor their community, is the outstanding controversy that has had the board's consideration.

Years ago it handed down a decision that the name of Rainier should remain, but the town did not wish to abide by the decision and took its case to congress in the form of a bill, which is now pigeon-holed.

"The names given to natural features," says Bond, "afford the greatest number of controversies. They are generally of haphazard origin, of incidental or accidental application to meet a passing need."

Woman Seeks Degree After 8 Years' Lapse

Columbia, S. C.—Absence of eight years from college has proved no deterrent to Mrs. Irene Wellwood, who is seeking a degree at the University of South Carolina this year. She celebrated her decision to return to work by achieving the highest single average of any member of the Chi Omega sorority group, which in turn showed the highest scholastic average of any women's group on the campus.

Mrs. Wellwood is the wife of Arthur R. Wellwood, resident engineer at the Saluda power dam under construction 17 miles from here. Her marriage caused her to withdraw from Vassar college eight years ago, but she is determined to complete her college work.

Expressing the opinion that women cannot find a satisfying life in a round of tea, bridge and housework when they have stopped their education, Mrs. Wellwood intends to tour Europe this summer to perfect her knowledge of French so that she may teach it.

France May Sell Part of Stamp Collection

Paris.—France may sell part of its stamp collection. This is the complete set of postage stamps issued by France since stamps first were used here in 1848, a collection that covers eighty years.

The government mint keeps the rare collection with the old copper plates that made them in a safe that holds the dies for stamping metal money and the official set of platinum weights and measures. There are three keys to the safe, each held by a different official and all necessary for the opening of the big treasure chest. There are several sheets of many issues of the old stamps and often a number of proofs in various colors that were never adopted. Also, there are many foreign stamps, obtained through exchanges with other governments.

Mint officials propose putting a complete set in the National library and selling the remainder, expecting to get big prices.

1 Man Takes 23 Years to Stop Panhandling

New York.—The efforts of one man over a period of twenty-three years have made Brooklyn a city practically free from beggars, according to a statement issued by the Brooklyn bureau of charities in connection with its fiftieth anniversary campaign for a fund of \$2,000,000.

John D. Godfrey, insolvency officer, for a generation has been the determined foe of the fraudulent "Hoppers," "throwouts," "St-throws" and "deaf and dumb artists." He has arrested and warned some 10,000 beggars in the course of his career and last year caused the arrest of 38. Not one beggar on the streets has been found to be really deserving. "Beggars are just good business men," Mr. Godfrey said. "A capable beggar makes from \$15 to \$500 a day and hardly a one of them but has a substantial bank account."

OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

The walnut outlook is most encouraging, according to W. H. Bentley, manager of the Dundee Walnut association.

Sixty bushels of wheat to the acre is the result of the harvest on a tract of land in the Tule Lake district of Klamath county.

The first contribution to the Florida relief fund at Bend came from a farmer with a large family. He gave five boxes of apples.

Professor Drill of Oregon State college is in possession of several glass balls found on the coast and presumably washed from Japan.

The ancient carrier that has been called the "Galloping Goose" has been taken off the railroad between Willamina and Grand Ronde.

Hordes of ducks and geese threaten to consume a large part of the wheat and barley crop of Cox Brothers at Tule Lake, Klamath county.

Arlington has a good many up-to-date buildings, which have been added to by the new garage of Snell & Lemmon, with the latest in equipment.

The Sitcoos Rod and Gun club has been organized and a meeting of Eugene and Portland sportsmen interested was held at Ada recently.

The Oregon state horsehoe champion pitcher is Henry McGraw, 20, of Woodburn, who attained this honor recently at the Washington county fair.

Teachers who smoke cigarettes will not hold their jobs in the Eugene schools, according to a resolution adopted by the Eugene board of education.

A carload of Klamath pumice has been shipped to San Francisco to be tested as to its commercial value as a material in certain types of construction.

Threshing operations have been somewhat delayed in the Wallowa section during the past week, due to two heavy rains which fell during the past few days.

Rate reductions representing an annual saving of \$90,000 to domestic and commercial lighting customers have been made by the California-Oregon Power company.

W. M. Dickerson of Bend has in his garden a squash vine that has borne seven squashes whose total weight is 103 pounds. The largest squash weighs 22 pounds.

Secretary of the State has announced the appointment of \$305, 203.07 in automobile license fees and \$19,154.15 in bus and truck fees among counties. The sums represent one-fourth of the fees, less administrative expenses, collected in the respective counties for the six-month period ending September 15. The bus and truck fee appointment is made from funds collected by the public service commission on a mileage basis from the buses and trucks operating between fixed termini.

Linn county voters will vote on a 2-mill levy to raise \$60,000 with which to match state and federal funds for the construction of the Santiam highway to the summit of the Cascades.

There are approximately 187 widows in Seaside, according to a recent unofficial census made at a local hotel, with an estimated 13 "grass" widows within the city limits, making the surprising total of 200 widows of the "sed" and "grass" variety.

Fire of undetermined origin did thousands of dollars' damage to the two-story frame building occupied by the J. C. Porter general merchandise store in Newberg.

The Marmot school district has purchased a bus to transport the children of the district to the Sandy school, which is consolidated this year with Marmot and Firwood.

Asland voters will pass judgment on three proposed city charter amendments in November. One change increases the term of councilmen from two years to four years.

The graydiggers, a pest of the farmer despite the war that has been waged on them this summer, have in places around Sweet Home devoured entire crops of potatoes.

Miss Florence Conner of Hibbard creek, Baker county, killed a 300-pound bear near her home recently with a .30-calibre rifle, bringing the animal out of a pine tree.

About 60 relatives and friends called at the G. A. Krigbaum home in Estacada recently for a family reunion and to offer congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Krigbaum on their 60th wedding anniversary.

Because of the crowded condition of the Marion county jail Sheriff Bower has been compelled to take over four cells in the city jail. There are now 34 prisoners in the county jail, with normal accommodations for 30.

Fire started by two hunters destroyed a large donkey engine, skyline and other logging equipment owned by the Westwood Lumber company at Ripple. Hard work by a large crew of men saved the camp of the company.

Plans are under way for the shipping of 400 head of dairy cows from Coos county to Gaselle and Bakersfield, Cal., by James T. Jenkins, county commissioner. The stock is largely grade Jerseys and a few Holsteins.

Milton's new \$25,000 municipal hydro-electric plant was set in operation for the first time last week. The plant is rated at 1250 horsepower and 600, with the old plant, rated at about 600 horsepower, will be able to furnish light and power for residents of Milton-Freewater and the surrounding district. In eight years the original plant paid for itself and also pulled the city of Milton out of debt. In 1920 Milton owed over \$110,000, but this was reduced to \$23,000 at the time the new plant was started.
