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## Oregon Boys Victorious Twice in National 4-H Club Championship

Corvallis, Ore.—Champions come and champions go, but Oregon remains the winner again this year in national boys' and girls' club work honors. Still thrilling with the unprecedented victory last year when Alex Cruickshank, sophomore at Oregon state college from McMinnville, won a double national championship, Oregon finds itself this year as the home of his successor, Edgar Grimes of Harrisburg.

Young Grimes, 17, was entered by the state club headquarters in the extension service here as the outstanding club boy in Oregon to compete with the other 47 state champions for the Moses trophy offered to the club boy in the United States showing the best qualities of leadership in his community and state. He won out over all contestants, and was awarded the huge silver trophy and a free trip to the national club congress in Chicago.

Grimes has been in club work eight years during which time he completed 31 projects and made 178 exhibits at fairs. He led one club last year and seven this year to 100 percent completion. Prizes in cash livestock and trips won total \$2,722 including a \$250 heifer given this year by Governor I. L. Patterson to the best dairy club member in the state. In addition he owns more than \$2,000 in livestock and has sold \$1,250 worth. He finished high school last year with highest honors and will enter the state college as a freshman in agriculture next year.

## Starts A Fact Rightly

Safeguarding American Rights And Liberties

No man has ever stated the fundamental principles of our theory of government or the ideals of its founders in clearer language than President-elect Herbert Hoover. His words lift themselves above partisan politics and lay down fundamentals which every American citizen should read and study from the standpoint of their bearing on his daily life. In his New York speech, Mr. Hoover said in part:

"The Government in commercial business does not tolerate among its customers the freedom of competitive reprisals to which private business is subject. Bureaucracy does not tolerate the spirit of independence; it spreads the spirit of submission into our daily life and penetrates the temper of our people not with the habit of powerful resistance to wrong but with the habit of timid acceptance of irresistible might."

"Bureaucracy is ever desirous of spreading its influence and its power. You cannot extend the mastery of the Government over the daily working life of a people without at the same time making it the master of the people's souls and thoughts. Every expansion of Government in business means that Government in order to protect itself from the poli-

George P. Gove, N. R. Gilbert and Dr. J. F. Hosh were elected as Bend's first city commissioners under the new commission-manager form of government authorized by the voters at a special election October 16.

Erection of a new telephone building in Salem at a cost of approximately \$140,000 was announced recently. The site for the new building was purchased by the telephone company recently at a cost of \$25,000.

Crack Southern Pacific Flyer Ditched.

Roseburg, Or.—A loose tire of the fourth drivewheel of the locomotive pulling the Southern Pacific southbound Shasta limited No. 11 Sunday afternoon, derailed six cars about 7 1/2 miles north of Roseburg on a straightaway track at Duddy station, injuring nearly a score of passengers, none of whom, fortunately, was seriously hurt.

Duncan, Okla. — Lieutenant Park Sanders of Lawton, Okla., was burned to death and his mechanic, Clement Migliore of New York, suffered severe burns when their airplane was destroyed by fire while they were taking off from Haliburton field here.

Spur, Texas.—Five men were burned to death six miles north of here late Saturday when the tri-motored airplane in which they were flying en route from San Antonio to Denver crashed and burst into flames.

San Francisco, Cal.—James A. Talbot, chairman of the board of Western Air Express, has announced that the company is planning a transcontinental air service between San Francisco bay points and New York.

tical consequences of its errors and wrongs, is driven irresistibly without peace to greater and greater control of the nation's press and platform. Free speech does not live many hours after free industry and free commerce die.

"It is a false liberalism that interprets itself into the Government operation of commercial business. Every step of bureaucratizing of the business of our country poisons the very roots of liberalism—that is, political equality, free speech, free assembly, free press and equality of opportunity. It is the road not to more liberty but to less liberty. Liberalism should be found not striving to spread bureaucracy but striving to set bounds to it. True liberalism seeks all legitimate freedom, first in the confident belief that without such freedom the pursuit of all other blessings and benefits is vain. That belief is the foundation of all American progress, political as well as economic."

"Liberalism is a force truly of the spirit, a force proceeding from the deep realization that economic freedom cannot be sacrificed if political freedom is to be preserved. Even if governmental conduct of business could give us more efficiency instead of less efficiency, the fundamental objection to it would remain unaltered and unabated. It would destroy political equality. It would increase rather than decrease abuse and corruption. It would stifle initiative and invention. It would undermine the development of leadership. It would cramp and cripple the mental and spiritual energies of our people. It would extinguish equality and opportunity. It would dry up the spirit of liberty and progress. For these reasons primarily it must be resisted. For a hundred and fifty years liberalism has found its true spirit in the American system, not in the European systems."

## Time Saving Recipes



"I MUST hurry home and get dinner." How often have you heard someone break up a pleasant party with those words? Of course, there has to be a dinner to satisfy hungry appetites, but there are meals which can be prepared in a minimum of time—and they are the ones to plan when you expect to be out the whole afternoon.

One of the secrets of time saving is to use canned meats or fish. Vienna sausage, roast beef, corned beef, veal loaf, salmon, tuna fish and others come in cans. Canned vegetables and fruits, too, will save many minutes of laborious peeling and cooking. Their use means that the main ingredients of your menu are already prepared.

### A Half-Hour Menu

The following menu can be prepared easily in half an hour and is filling enough for even the hungriest little boy: Tuna Fish au Gratin, Buttered Peas, Boiled Potatoes, Hot Biscuits and Jelly, Tomato and Let-

tuce Salad, Fruit Compote, Cookies. The peas are heated in the juice from the can, and then seasoned with butter, pepper and salt. By slicing the potatoes thin and boiling them in a tightly covered vessel they will cook in ten or fifteen minutes. And biscuits, of course, take only a few minutes to prepare.

To prepare the fish, shred contents of a large can of tuna. Melt two tablespoons butter, stir in two tablespoons flour, one-eighth teaspoon paprika, one-eighth teaspoon pepper and one-half teaspoon salt. Add one cup of milk gradually and stir until thick; add one cup grated cheese and stir until melted. Combine with the fish, pour into a buttered baking dish, cover with one-fourth cup buttered crumbs and brown a few minutes in a very hot oven.

A can of fruits for salad can be left to chill in the ice box during the day and will make a delicious compote for dessert. Or you might use a pudding or pie that had been made in the morning.
