Sheep on The Farm

Shearer Grange Sponsors Meeting at Grass Valley to Assist Farmers

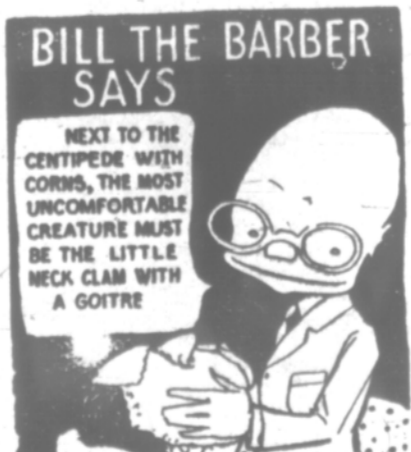

Chimney Spark Starts Fire

The Clare Axtell home on Scott street had a close escape from destruction by fire about 7 a. m. Tuesday morning when the shingle roof was discovered to be on fire by a neighbor.

At first the fire was thought to have started inside the roof close to the square top finish, but later it was concluded to have started from a spark, from the terra cotta flue close by, which had lodged under the shingles.

The fire for a short time was a stubborn one, running just under the edge of the shingles and spreading from place to place. Damage was nominal, confined to a small part of the roof and some damage by water to the interior.

At the time of the fire three members of the family were sick in bed; Mr. Axtell with an attack of pneumonia, and a boy and girl sick with an attack of the flu. These were removed to Mrs. Sayr's residence close by and reports say that they have not suffered from their forced removal.

Home Pointers

(From School of Home Economics)

Cranberry ice may be served in tall glasses with the meat course and is a change from cranberry sauce or cranberry jelly.

Celery, cut fine and added to cranberry jelly just before it stiffens, is very nice. This is molded and later garnished with celery.

Left-over ham is excellent creamed and highly seasoned. One tablespoon of Worcestershire sauce to each cup of white sauce may be used.

One pound of brick butter equals two cups. To get one cup cut in two crosswise. A half cup is one-fourth of the brick and one-fourth cup or four tablespoons is one-eighth of the brick.

A very simple and delicious candy may be made from dried fruits by grinding them with cocoanut. After the fruits are ground together the mixture may be rolled into any shape desired and sprinkled with powdered sugar.

Ham butter for sandwiches is a picnic accessory that may be made and kept in a cool place ready for several days. To make: Chop boiled ham and mix with almost an equal amount of butter. It is best to keep it closely covered and in a cool place.

Bacon drippings add flavor to every food that is cooked in them, or in which they are used. The drippings are especially good in sauces for meats and vegetables. When added to the dressing for fowl and other meats, a particularly rich flavor is produced.

A large, boneless piece of roast which is slightly underdone may be reheated in the piece, by mashing enough potatoes to cover the meat with a layer about one-fourth of an inch thick. Season the potatoes with salt, pepper, a little milk and butter or drippings, spread over the meat, brush with beaten egg and dredge with crumbs. Put in a baking dish in a hot oven, heat until nicely browned.
