McKay Dam Near Pendleton Mecca For Fishing

Sportsmen of Umatilla county and the adjoining eastern Oregon territory are experiencing the greatest fishing they have ever known, in the McKay dam which is located several miles from Pendleton. Eastern Brook trout by the hundreds are being daily taken from the dam and sportsmen of the Umatilla country regard the place as a second Diamond Lake. In a letter to the state game commission Sol J. Baum of Pendleton reports that fish in large numbers up to 20 inches in length are being caught every day. The commission made its first planting of Eastern Brook trout in the dam in 1927. The fry planted were on an average of five inches in length. Subsequent plantings have been made until the waters of the dam abound with the trout. More plantings will be made this year. One reason given by the commission for the great growth of the Eastern Brooks is that the dam contains almost an unlimited supply of natural food.

"Electric Hen" Hatches 20,000 Chicks

Electricity hatches the chickens, milks the cows and tends the furnace on a model electric farm established in Ontario, Canada. It was planned to demonstrate the use of almost every type of electrically-operated farm machinery.
One of the most striking features is a giant electric incubator capable of replacing a thousand setting hens. It hatches 20,000 chicks at a time.
Besides the farm machinery, all modern home conveniences operated by electricity have been installed, says Popular Science Monthly. They include vacuum sweepers, electric washers, ironers, fans, and even an electric furnace that operates automatically. Most farms in Ontario are wired for electricity. The current comes from the hydroelectric plants at Niagara Falls.

State Revenues Less Than Income

State Grange Asks to Be Informed Regarding State Deficit

Granges generally are actively interested in the affairs of the state, especially regarding taxation and revenue. In a recent communication from the Clackamas county Pomona Grange, Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, was asked for a statement of the financial condition of the commonwealth, based upon the appropriations of the last legislature, the measures vetoed by the governor, and the existing financial deficit.

In his reply, the secretary of state presented the following statement, of general interest to all tax-payers as the condition facing the state at this time:

According to the 4th state budget, as presented to the last session of the legislature, the governor made net recommendations in the sum of \$7,003,972.15.
The legislature disallowed from the above amount activities aggregating \$45,994.82.
Net recommendations of the governor approved \$6,957,977.33.
In addition to the recommendations of the governor, the 35th legislature passed legislation appropriating \$1,012,451.45.
Of this amount the governor vetoed \$91,900.00.
Net total appropriations in addition to the amount recommended by the governor \$920,551.45.
Total appropriations made by the 35th legislative assembly, not including fixed millage tax items, annual and continuing appropriations \$7,878,528.78.

In the preparation of the 1929-1930 budget, it was made to balance expenditures against receipts with no regard for the existing deficit as of December 31, 1928. In other words, it was desired to make the appropriations for 1929-1930 equal the revenue that was in sight for the biennium. In the foregoing statement there is no provision to meet the item of \$920,551.45 unless revenue will be forthcoming from the laws enacted by the last assembly known as the income tax act, intangibles tax and excise tax acts.

The deficit on December 31, 1928 aggregated \$2,358,962.01, and to the extent that authorized appropriations are not spent and revenue is received in excess of the estimates will this amount be reduced.
