(From School of Home Economics)
Soil surveys have been made of a great many counties of Oregon resulting in the accumulation of much valuable data to present and prospective farmers of this state. The meaning and use of this information is explained in a new bulletin just issued by the state college experiment station, copies of which may be had free.
