Oregon State News

President Hoover's proposal to allow the western states to take over all unappropriated public lands is favored by Governor Patterson, according to announcement made at the executive department in Salem recently.

George Rogers, Wallows county game warden, has been informed that a herd of five deer, led by a ferocious four-point buck, is making harvesting operations difficult on the A. Austin ranch north of Flora. Austin said it is unsafe for a man to enter the field on foot, and that the deer have frightened his horses, making it difficult to control them.

The waters of the Owyhee river are now flowing through the big diversion tunnel at the side of the Owyhee dam near Ontario. Cofferdams will soon be started above and below the site of the dam foundation and excavation for the big structure started.

Disappointment in the yield of navy beans being grown in Umatilla and Walla Walla counties by the Eckhoff Farm Products company is being expressed by some farmers on whose lands the beans are being raised. No figures will be released by the company on the yield, but it is rumored that in some instances it has not amounted to more than two bushels to the acre.

Warned by H. H. Weatherspoon of the Oregon state horticulture department, that they are ruining their own reputations and the reputation of the Walla Walla valley prune district, and of the state of Oregon as a whole, the prune growers at a mass meeting in Freewater recently voted to ask the shippers to hold up shipments of all prunes until the fruit is pronounced mature by the inspectors.

In order that the road may be widened in the Dickey Prairie country near Molalla, 25 feet of land on each side of the property has been donated.

Mining development near Lostine in Wallows county has been promised by Edgar Marvi, secretary of the Contact Mining & Milling company of Spokane.

Miss Alene Phillips of Oregon City has accepted a position as private secretary to Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, and will enter upon her duties September 1.

Through a deal consummated recently, Elmer H. Balsiger, prominent business man of Klamath Falls, becomes owner of the former White Pelican hotel.

Additions to Cottage Grove central grade school building, to cost \$10,000, are nearly completed and extensive repairs to the high school building are under way.

The state flax plant at Salem has received a check for approximately \$3000, covering a carload of flaxseed shipped to the Portland Linseed Oil company. The price was \$2.91 per 100 pounds.

The body of Mrs. Addie Sly, 45, the mother of two children, and employe of the Hotel Seaside, was found in the brush on the outskirts of Seaside. She had been shot through the head. A small caliber pistol lay near her hand.

Construction of the new Revenue bridge across the Sandy river has been completed by Rigdon brothers, Woodburn contractors, but Clackamas county will have to grade the approaches before the bridge will be opened to traffic.

The threshing season has opened in full blast at Sweet Home, and G. O. Felgus had his heavy crop of barley, oats and wheat threshed, which ran about 30 to 40 bushels to the acre on the average, one of the heaviest crops he has raised for years.

Bids for construction of the first unit of St. Mary's college at the Christie home near Oswego, will be called about September 1. It was learned recently. This unit will cost about \$275,000, and will consist of the main administration building and one dormitory.

Three thousand dollars damage was done by fire to the plant of the Northwest Cities Gas company in Eugene. The blaze started from a spark which alighted in a vat of tar and spread rapidly. The roof of the boiler room was burned off and the interior badly damaged.

The United States bureau of roads plans to eliminate five or six turns while widening the Mount Hood Loop highway on Laurel hill. Clearing is being done on the new survey, most of which is through heavy timber. This widening and changing of lines will be of great service to motorists when completed.
