Oregon State News

Twelve carloads of lambs were shipped from Redmond after finishing the drive from the hills in good condition. They were shipped by the Coffin Sheep company.

John Herring and Ellis Baker of Dundee have their new six-tunnel recirculating dryer going full blast. The prune picking and drying was started in Dundee last week.

Coculle announces dates for the annual corn show as October 25 and 26. Later in September a full announcement will be made, listing most of the proposed attractions.

The second China pheasant suicide of the season was reported by State Probation Commissioner Alexander. Near Hubbard, a cock flew straight into the windshield of his car, shattering the glass and dropped dead.

With the opening of "freshman week" at the University of Oregon, extensive preparations are being made for what is expected to be the busiest year the university ever had, Karl W. Onthank, executive secretary at the university, says.

Governor Patterson's proclamation closing the deer season applies to grouse and other birds and animals, according to a legal opinion prepared by the attorney-general at Salem. The opinion was requested by C. C. Probstel, district attorney of Umatilla county.

Death claimed one of Albany's most prominent pioneer business men when W. W. Crawford, 72, native of Linn county, died at his home there. Mr. Crawford was born on the donation land claim of his parents, Dr. and Mrs. G. F. Crawford, near Lebanon, February 17, 1857.

What a thief could want of a ball nearly eight feet in diameter is a mystery to Cliff Knowdell, captain of the Albany Kiwanis club pushball team, but the fact remains that a pushball was stolen from the Linn county fairgrounds recently. The loss is estimated at \$700.

Checked at almost every turn, but only after it had destroyed nine homes, a hotel and a school house and had roared its blistering way over thousands of acres of land, the fire which for two harrowing days and nights threatened the town of Estacada was finally declared beaten.

Fire of unknown origin destroyed the pumping plant at Blalock Island recently. The blacksmith shop and the roof of one dwelling house were burned, with damage set at \$20,000. Blalock Island is owned by the River-view Farm corporation. The pump supplied irrigation water for 500 acres on the island.

Provision for the purchase of a site for a junior high school is one of the surprises of the 1929-30 budget for the Pendleton school district, announced by the budget committee. As a second surprise, provision is made for the retiring of \$10,000 in bonds and the clearing of the district from debt within another year.

Word was received at Oregon City that the old Carver railroad will be rehabilitated and extended and operated by the Clackamas Eastern railway, a new \$300,000 corporation. The line and its extension will feed from the forest resources of 300,000,000 feet of timber in the Viola country, where three sawmills are under construction.

Ash Swale, a community near Brownsville, won the community exhibit contest at the Linn county fair, when its collection of agricultural products was judged the best in the pavilion. Scrabellill won second prize and Shedd third. Western Star grange won first and Morning Star grange second in their class with similar exhibits.

A shipment of 110,000 pounds of tan bark from Polk county was ordered recently by General Manager O. M. Plummer of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition as one item on his long list of preparations for next month's big stock show to be held in Portland. The tan bark will be utilized in dressing the floors of the big horse show arena.

Oregon State News

Damages of \$15,000 is sought by Walter Winslow, Salem attorney; Frank Minto, chief of police, and Charles Vick, prominent automobile dealer, in a suit filed in the circuit court at Salem against F. A. Elliott, state forester, and Fred Southwick, V. A. Blakeley and J. F. Cassidy, fire wardens. The plaintiffs, while in Douglas county awaiting the opening of the deer season, were drafted as fire fighters.

The seating capacity of Hayward field in Eugene will be increased this year. When the new arrangements are completed there will be room for about 18,000 fans for the big homecoming game with Oregon State there November 16. Bleacher seats from the baseball field will be moved over to the south end of the stands and the seats constructed in front of the east grandstand for the Sunset Trail pageant will be used for football games.

Sheridan schools will open October 7. It was at first expected to open them September 23, but owing to the need of helpers in the prune orchards, it was deemed advisable by the school board to postpone the opening. The contracts for drivers and bus transporting pupils to Sheridan schools were awarded to Lee Ladd on the west route, taking in Buell and Williams districts, and to R. S. Derrick on the east route, comprising the Bellevue and Gopher valley districts.

With the election of James T. Chinnock of Grants Pass as president and Dr. W. L. Powers of Corvallis as secretary, the selection of Burns for the 1930 convention and recommendation to Governor Patterson that the name of E. C. Van Petton of Ontario be submitted to President Hoover for appointment as a member of the commission to study the public land policy and recommend changes, the Oregon Reclamation congress concluded its annual convention at Ontario recently.

Organization of a cow testing association consisting of dairymen of Linn and Benton counties was effected recently at Shedd, when 32 cattle growers met. The Linn-Benton Dairy Herd Improvement association was adopted as the name of the group.

Good progress is being made in the grading and re-laying of culverts and making new drain ditches on the Dayton Salem market road by Harry Powell of Dundee and Charles Green of McMinnville, who are in charge of the work in the Unionvale section.

Moro School Notes

The Moro schools opened Monday, September 16, with a record enrollment. A number of new students have since been added, bringing the total enrollment in grades and high school up to 138.

In the high school the freshmen lead with 23 members, the juniors follow with 14, the sophomores with 13, and the seniors with 10.

Grade school attendance is distributed thus: 8 in eighth grade, 11 in seventh, 12 in sixth, 8 in fifth, 8 in fourth, 13 in third, 9 in second, and 9 in first grade. The total in the grade school is 78, and of the high school 60. Twenty students, representing both high and grade schools, are coming in from Boardman district in the new buses.

The Hood River football team defeated the Moro high school players on Hood River's grounds Saturday by a score of 7-0.
