Move Started to Bridge The Columbia at Maryhill

At a meeting of officers and members of the three Commercial Clubs of Sherman county, representing the sentiment of Wasco, Grass Valley and Moro, held Wednesday evening at a banquet at Hotel Moro when members and officers of the Goldendale Commercial Club were guests of the Sherman county clubs, latent sentiment was crystallized into aggressive action to start the ball for united effort to bring about construction of a free from tolls bridge over the Columbia river between Biggs and Maryhill.

At the close of the banquet, J. B. Adams, president of Moro club, presiding, nearly every one from all the different sections were called upon to state their ideas of action. Many different phases of action were discussed, with final action resulting in appointment of a committee to formulate a concrete plan and call a second meeting at Goldendale in the near future.

Manager E. E. Larimore, before the meeting, had gotten in touch with Samuel Hill, noted good roads builder, and read a telegram from Mr. Hill to the meeting. Following this, it was thought best to delay action until advice could be secured from Mr. Hill as how best to proceed to secure the desired result—a bridge free from tolls.

Foundation upon which to build hopes of a free from tolls bridge at this point on the Columbia, was the present attitude of the federal bureau of good roads in insisting that the Sherman Highway be practically rebuilt to take care of heavy traffic and that this route through Sherman county had previously been designated as U. S. Highway No. 97, extending from Mexico on the south through California into Oregon and through Goldendale and the state of Washington to British Columbia on the north. All of this is coupled with the known fact that this highway route is the only international north and south highway that truly can be said to be an "Every Day" route—winter or summer.
