Many Predatory Animals Killed By Hunters

The United States department of agriculture, bureau of biological survey, and the Oregon State Livestock Sanitary Board jointly with cooperating counties reporting for the month of September stated that during the month 28 hunters worked a total of 818 days and took 412 coyotes, 37 bobcats and eleven stock killing bears.

The hunter who worked in Sherman county, Bart S. Bobbs, killed 3 bobcats and 19 coyotes, a total of 22 animals.

Owing to the extreme drought, coyotes have congregated about the ranches and water courses where they have caused considerable losses to live stock the past two months and now that winter is approaching and cold weather prevails on the higher range, hunters are actively engaged in preparing for extensive poison operations.

Some private trappers have made statements that scent formulas used by government trappers could not be secured for private use.

The new bridge over the Umpqua river at Scottsburg was opened to traffic October 10.

Fifty-five million chinook salmon eggs will be hatched in Oregon this year, reports the state fish commission.

The widening of the John Day highway between Vale and Jamieson has been about completed by a state highway department crew.

The Farm Bureau Cooperative has completed details for the 1929 shipment of turkeys from the Rogue River valley.

George E. Willinger of Willbridge and James Knight of Riddle were arrested for spot lighting deer on upper Cow creek.

Several fields in the Merrill district, Klamath county, have produced as high as 300 sacks of potatoes to the acre.

Miss Dorothy Neal has opened the Mountain View school in Marion county with 16 pupils.

A total of 246 guinea fowl and 114 wild turkeys from the state game farm at Corvallis were liberated in Curry county recently.

The Central Point grange Friday took up the question of raising funds to assist in the erection of a monument marking the site of old Fort Lane, near Tolo, where United States soldiers were quartered more than 70 years ago when an Indian war was in progress.

Curry county will receive a check from the federal government for \$2934, an amount equal to the taxes which would have accrued on the Oregon & California railroad land grants from 1916 to 1928 had the property not been taken over by the federal government.
