Four deaths in Portland for the four weeks ending October 5 showed a marked increase over the corresponding period of 1928, according to the commerce department.

The postponement of the deer hunting season for 12 days this autumn not only cut into the time allotted to the hunter for bagging his quarry, but it also cut down the income of the state from licenses almost \$30,000.

Improvement of the short piece of the Pacific highway near the New Era hill has been completed, and as this is the last stretch of the highway unimproved, the entire road will be opened to traffic for the first time in over a year.
