Moro School Notes

Attendance: The seventh and eighth grades were winners of the attendance award for the sixth school week. The percentage of attendance of the entire school for the month just ended was 97.2. Six students were tardy during the month, compared with 77 for the same period last year. Ninety students were neither absent nor tardy for the four weeks period.

Redmond Defeats Moro: The Moro football team was defeated by Redmond Saturday, Oct. 27, in a hard game which ended with 25-0 score. Moro was weakened by the absence during part of the game of three of the regular players-Captain Burnet, Roscoe Hansley, and Lyle Woods.

The girls' volleyball team will play at Grass Valley Friday night, Nov. 1. Honor Students: Those students in high school with a scholastic average of 90% or above for the first six weeks period are Lois Bryant, junior, 95.75%; Charles Burnet, junior, 94.5%; Viola Hansen, junior, 93.5%; Ethelyn Kessinger, senior, 92.75%; Johnny Gentry, freshman, 92.75%; Lamer Sayers, senior, 92%; Bernard Rice, junior, 92%; Doris Amidon, sophomore, 90.8%; Doris Fortner, freshman, 90.25%.

Exemption System: A system whereby those high school students earning a grade of 90% or over in any subject may be exempted from the semester examinations in that subject has been decided upon by the high school faculty. However, in addition to the scholarship the student who is to be exempted must have a 90% citizenship grade. Citizenship includes the student's attitude and behavior during the school hours. All students will be required to take the six weeks examinations.

Scout News: Scout Troop No. VI of Moro met at the Moro school building Wednesday evening, October 23. Maps of the Deschutes National forest reserve were studied. It has been planned to pass tests, to be ready for the next court of honor at this meeting, but it was postponed, as only a small number of Scouts were present. Tom Fraser, leader of the Owl Patrol, and Charles Boardman, leader of the Arrow Patrol, are working on a progress chart that will show the standing of each member of the troop.

The Biennial Nat'l Convention of the Assemblies of God, with publishing plant and executive offices at Springfield, Missouri, met recently at Wichita, Kansas. From their report, we learn the following: In 1914 about fifty Full Gospel Ministers met and effected the organization known as the Assemblies of God. There are now 1641 ministers on the list, with 1612 Assemblies, showing a combined membership of over 91,000, which does not fully represent the numerical strength of the fellowship. One of five of the ministers is a foreign missionary in active work. To whom was sent the past two years over \$500,000.00—more than \$20,000.00 per mo. besides probably half as much more sent otherwise than thru the missionary dept. Not one cent of money given for the Missionary Fund goes for office or sending expenses—every dollar given reaches the field. J. D. and Mrs. Miller, pastors.

Near the close of the sketch, Mr. Neel presented several numbers on the harmonica in a masterly manner. The music company also used an electric panopticon to play musical selections and dance numbers for the Legion members in their meeting hall at the close of the public meeting. Partly from funds taken by public subscription and partly using his private funds, W. S. Powell left here Tuesday for Walla Walla to attend a conference of Pacific northwest wheat growers meeting to consider the means whereby this section of the United States can be included in the activities of the Federal Farm Board loan corporation. The meeting was called for Wednesday and Thursday of this week and may result in farmers securing government loans to finance a carry-over of their crop until better prices can be had, at a rate of about four per cent. Before this can be materialized it may be necessary to form a cooperative farm bloc and this is also partly the reason why Mr. Powell left for the meeting.
